### EXTRA PAY ALLOWED LEVEE CONTRACTOR.

A joint meeting of the executive and financial committees of the Orleans Levee Board was held last week to consider matters connected with the enlargement of the levee, from the Canal street landing to the Algiers sawmill, Algiers side of the river. T. O. Hotard, who had been awarded the contract, presented a claim for \$585 for actual additional work. When the work was contemplated the Johnson Iron Works informed the board that it was building some boats on the barge, and asked that its work be not interfered with by the levee contractor. The board granted this request, and contractors were notified before they bid that they would not be permitted to use the barge at that particular point. The consequence was that Hotard was compelled to haul earth from a distance to fill the dike.

The committee refused to grant him the sum asked for, but in turn offered to recompense him for the loss to the extent of \$300, which he in turn declined, offering to accept \$225 instead. This was finally agreed upon as a compromise of the matter.

W. G. Coyle and the Monongahela Consolidated Coal Company petitioned the board that certain buildings they have in the line of the work be not disturbed, agreeing to meet any additional cost of the work in consequence. This request was granted by the committee.
