**MORE BURGLARIES
IN ALGIERS**

To say that the Algiers women as well as some men are in a state of excitement about our nightly robberies is to treat the subject very mildly, but Supt. James W. Reynolds is certainly making every effort to catch these midnight prowlers. It was stated that on Monday and Tuesday nights there were twenty or more police on our side of the river in an attempt to break up these robberies and we could not go to press without congratulating the vigilance of one of the officers who arrested a boy about sixteen or seventeen years old. The young man was seen coming out of one of our residences at a late hour where he had been sent on an important mission; he carried a lighted lantern. The diligent officer arrested the boy and took him back to the residence whence he had come to ascertain whether or not the young man had been there for a specific purpose, and after being assured that it was all right, he was allowed to go his way, which was brightly lighted with the big lantern he was carrying. So from this we might well see that a genuine crook, burglar, vagabond or loiterer will have little chance on our streets, especially at night.

During the week many robberies have been reported and several attempts were made to gain entrance into residences which were not reported to the police. On Monday night an attempt was again made to enter the residence of Dr. John A. Rupp. Dr. Rupp stated that his house had been equipped with burglar alarms for the past ten years, but as the burglar business was not very thriving in Algiers until recently he had allowed his batteries to die out; but after the stimulation in the trade the Doctor thought it was best to renew the batteries and it was only a few nights later when the little "buzz" up in his room announced that a midnight visitor was about to make his entrance into one of the windows downstairs. Dr. Rupp at once went to the lower floor, but no doubt the burglar heard his approach or very likely the same alarm which notified Dr. Rupp also notified the burglar that it was time to make his escape.

This negro was arrested some time ago for stealing a case of whiskey from Kleinkemper's

store, and Miss Myra Martin of 319 Eliza street has identified this negro as the one she saw in her yard on Sunday morning at 4:45 o'clock. Miss Martin is positive of the identification and says she knows Nobles well, he having delivered groceries to her home for several years. Nobles has been charged with breaking in and entering in the night time.

Sometime between 6 o'clock Friday evening and 12 o'clock noon Saturday, thieves stole a copper coil pipe, valued at \$100, from the old steamboat Grover Cleveland, lying near the head of Oliver street, the property of the Johnson Iron Works. It is believed that the thieves used a skiff in getting away with the booty.
