He was also a member of the Marine Engineers Association. Mr. King was for many years chief Engineer of the steam ferry boat, Carrier and Endeavor of the Southern Pacific Co. At the time of his death he was on the pension roll of the Southern Pacific Co., having faithfully served the allotted time for that company.

Mr. King was 65 years of age, and is survived by his wife, Mrs. Isabel Smith, his brother, Wm. Wilcox, and son and daughter, Samuel P. King and Mrs. Isabel Wezien.

CONFINED TO INSANE HOSPITAL.

The walls of the hospital for mental diseases now confine Miss Alice Dickerson, long the foe of police and landlords.

For years, the books of the police stations, have been adorned with the name of "Alice Dickerson." For many years she resided in our district.

The last straw in Miss Dickerson's career came last week, when she watched her brother, William Dickerson, die without medical aid, in their home at 2354 St. Thomas street.

Neighbors notified the police that the man was dying and that the woman refused to call physicians. Sergeant Johnson, of the Sixth precinct, went to the house and after battling a way through a pack of dogs, he found the man near death on a dirty cot. The woman sat beside him. She refused to let the police touch him.

**Dies After Reaching Charity Hospital**

Corporal Johnson talked with Miss Dickerson, while a policeman summoned the ambulance. Mr. Dickerson died shortly after the ambulance reached the hospital. He died of pneumonia.

It is computed in the police station that Miss Dickerson has been evicted from no fewer than 15 houses.

She has appeared before nearly every court in Louisiana to complain that she was the victim of police persecution. She is constantly fighting with her neighbors and when she is arrested she says that the police are aligned with her neighbors in persecuting her.




