 who escaped from the California State
 penitentiary. Garcia was arrested for
 loitering by Corporal George Bengert
 and Patrolman Charles Hyde in Elmi-
 ra street. H. Martine, 417 Elmira
 avenue, told the police that Garcia ad-
 mitted to him that he had killed a
 Mexican in California and that he es-
 caped while serving a ten years' sen-
 tence. He said he only served six
 months of his time.

 until the end of the scrap and then
 rushed up into the section from
 whence the missile had come.
 He issued a ringing challenge to the
 person who had thrown it, but said
 person refused to uncover himself.
 Then Promoter Lew Rose announced
 that he would give \$25 to the St. Al-
 phonsus Orphan Asylum if the identity
 of the culprit was made known.
