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### NAVAL STATION NOTES.

Light Vessel No. 81 arrived at the Station for overhauling and the installation of a complete radio set. It is estimated that from about eight to ten thousand dollars will be expended before the work is completed. The installation of this radio is in line with the decision of the Government to place wireless outfits on all the important light vessel stations.

The urgent repair work on the Petrel has been started and job orders for other work will be issued, and work begun after the receipt of the report of the Naval Board of Survey and Inspection. It is estimated that two months and a half will be necessary for the completion of this work.

The army dredge Benyaurd is in dock for about thirty days to undergo necessary repairs to her underwater machinery. All work during this overhaul will be performed by the Naval Station force, after competitive bidding against outside firms.

When light vessel 81 arrived she was caught in an eddy and collided with the Stranger. Very little damage was done to the Stranger, except one of her lifeboats which was stove in and rendered unfit for future service.

A call has gone in for about forty additional mechanics to carry on the amount of work caused by three vessels being repaired at the same time.

The Castine is about ready for sea and is expected to leave the 28th of this month. When this vessel leaves in her summer dress of white, New Orleans Naval Station's second bride goes to show the world that our State can hold its own with the navy yards of the country.

### SOUTHERN PACIFIC VIADUCT.

The old Southern Pacific viaduct, which has been out of commission for several months due to its dilapidated condition, is now being given a complete overhauling, and according to agreements with the city of New Orleans some time ago this viaduct is to be made more accessible by lowering the grade so that it will be a little more than four per cent; this is being accomplished by lowering the entire structure from one end to the other. Work on this is already begun and many workmen are engaged in removing the old planking, ready for the iron works to complete the structure.

With the completion of this viaduct in Patterson street, the one on Newton street and the foot passage-way which will be constructed in between these two viaducts, ample communication will be afforded between this side and what is commonly known as "the lower coast."

### ALGIERS DISTILLING COMPANY.

The work of completing the details for the beginning of the work in the Algiers Distilling Company is going along at a rapid rate. The company now is waiting for the completion of the enormous iron tank, which will be used for storing thousands of gallons of molasses, from which the alcohol will be distilled. There will be two large tanks erected for this purpose. The management believes that they will be able to begin active operations within the next ten days.
