NOW JUDGE BAUCUM.

In the second primary election which was held in Gulfport recently, Mr. William Wiggins Baucus, who is very favorably known in our city and who married one of our Algerians girls, Miss Lilly Wardrop, was declared one of the successful candidates for Judge of one of the districts of Gulfport in the hotly contested second primary election.

Judge Baucum made the race with five or six others for the position, and he came very near winning in the first primary; but in the second primary, which was held last week, his popularity was demonstrated by the fact that one of his opponents was a Confederate Veteran, whose residence is at Beauvoir.

Judge Baucum will preside as Judge over the district including Gulfport, Long Beach, Mississippi City, Lyman, Stonewall and Beauvoir. In each of these election districts Mr. Baucum had a handsome majority.
