### NAVAL STATION NOTES.

Admiral Benson, chief of division of operations, Navy Department, and Secretary Daniels' chief military advisor, visited the station Tuesday on an informal inspection tour. Chief Carpenter Burke's orders have been modified to the extent that he will remain at the station for one month after the reporting of his relief.

The U. S. S. Machais, a sister ship of the Castine, has arrived at the station for a short overhaul period. Repairs to be made consist mostly of work on her machinery.

The U. S. S. Wheeling, under command of Lieut. Com. Moody, U. S. N., will arrive at the station shortly to undergo extensive repairs.

The Naval Station has been awarded the contract for the repair work on the Lighthouse tender Consellia. This vessel will be sent to New Orleans as soon as she can be spared from her present duties.
