

AMENDMENT TO CHARTER OF THE INTERSTATE OIL, GAS AND DEVELOPMENT COMPANY.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, City of New Orleans, Parish of Orleans. Be it known, that on this 27th day of December, 1915, before me, Arthur B. Leopold, a notary public, duly commissioned and qualified, and for this city and the parish of Orleans, therein residing, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared: W. L. Wright and Milton H. Morrill, residents of the city of New Orleans, herein appearing in their capacity as chairman and secretary, respectively, of a stockholders' meeting of the Interstate Oil, Gas & Development Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, by virtue of acts of the Legislature of Louisiana, passed on the 20th day of September, 1914, and amended on the 27th day of August, 1915, and recorded in mortgage book 1127, 1915, and before the undersigned notary public, by act before the undersigned notary public, recorded in mortgage book 1127, 1915, and under the provisions of a resolution passed at the stockholders' meeting hereinafter mentioned, a copy of the minutes hereof is hereto annexed as part hereof, and who declared that at a general meeting of the stockholders of said corporation, held on the 27th day of November, 1915, which had been convened for that special purpose, and at which said meeting the following amendment to the charter of said corporation was adopted by a majority vote of the holders of all stock of said company present or represented at said meeting, to-wit:

Kid ornaments for trimming tailored hats are in good style. A new black velvet toque is made with a long tam-o'-shanter crown, the end of which is wound about the throat. There is a fur tassel on the end and a fur band around the toque. With the returned vogue for high collars, many of the detachable sort are sold in the shops. Some are made with extensions over the front of the bodice something in the manner of jabots. One of these shows a wide band of lace insertion for the base of the collar, with shirred georgette crape for the top and a frill of lace and crape at the front. For sports the smartest things in stockings are those of very heavy silk, striped in two or sometimes three colors—purple, green and black, for instance, or blue, purple and green. Brocade is used for bondoir slippers. The main color of the brocade should of course match the bondoir gown, and sometimes the brocaded silk slippers match the upholstery of the bondoir itself. Suede and leather are used for sports clothes of various sorts. A suede jacket is especially suitable for skating, as it is light, yet quite impervious to cold. It is thin and snug and can therefore be worn under a coat or jacket without adding bulkiness. Suede and leather must, of course, be made in strictly tailored fashion, depending on straps and stitching and pockets for trimming. ANNA MAY.
