## Algerines at Law.

### SUPREME COURT.

The Louisiana State Supreme Court on Monday handed down the largest number of decisions yet rendered on any given reading day during the present term of court—sixty-seven in number. The only one of general importance was that in the case of the city against F. G. T. Beck in which the city's rat-proofing ordinances were declared constitutional. The decision follows:

City of New Orleans vs. F. G. T. Beck—Ordinance No. 2512, Commission Council Series of the City of New Orleans, providing for the rat-proofing of all buildings and structures, etc., in said city, for the purpose of better preventing the introduction and spread of bubonic plague, held to be a constitutional and valid exercise of the police power of the state in the interest of the health of the people. Judgment affirmed.

### BIDS OPEN FOR THE NEW SCHOOL.

Bids for the construction of the new school building which is to be erected on the square bounded by Newton, Diana and Behrman streets were opened in the City Council Chamber Tuesday afternoon. There was only one bidder from Algiers, Jos. W. Lennox, whose bid was the second to the lowest, being \$41,750.

The lowest bid was that of John O. Chisholm, being \$41,680. The difference between Mr. Chisholm's bid and Mr. Lennox's is only \$70. The highest bid was \$43,866, making a difference of \$2186 between the highest and lowest bids.

The lowest bid for the building is \$11,680 more than the appropriation, but there is no doubt that the city will find the extra amount of money. When the new school building goes up, it will contain more than 220,000 feet of lumber and its roof will contain more than 300 squares of slate, being the largest roof constructed in this district.

It is stated that the new building will be ready for occupancy in the coming fall session.

### CHIEF CARPENTER BURKE RETURNED.

The officers of the Naval Station were agreeably surprised when Chief Carpenter Alonzo Burke, U. S. Navy, retired, again reported for duty at the Station Monday morning. Mr. Burke left our local Station about four months ago after serving here as custodian for several years. Mr. Burke had already been on the retired list when he was sent here to take charge of the Naval Station a few years ago, when it was first reopened. When the present commandant arrived, Mr. Burke was released as custodian, and then took up his duties as chief carpenter of the Station under Lieutenant Commander Wright, which position he held until he again retired four months ago.

Mr. Burke's return to the local station is significant to those interested in the development of our local navy yard. It is also another evidence that much more work will be done here and that additional trained men will be needed to carry on the additional work.

Simultaneously with the order given to Mr. Burke to proceed to the New Orleans Navy Yard for duty, there were orders given to twenty or thirty retired men to also prepare for active duty again. This might also indicate the nation's efforts for preparedness and to be ready should any of the present difficulties either with Germany or Mexico develop.

### BRISK BLAZE.

Fire of unknown origin that threatened several houses began early Friday morning in the front room of the residence owned by Peter Calderone, 1001 Newton street, and occupied by Joseph Loyacano. The house was damaged about \$1,000, and contents \$70. The dwelling is used as a fruit stand and residence by Loyacano, who is away at this time. Several rear rooms of the place are occupied by negroes, which cause the police to believe they may be responsible. An investigation is being made.
