### WANTS ALGIERS RAILWAY SOLD FOR CREDITORS

Charles A. Barnard, who some time ago labeled the Algiers Railway and Light Company, alleging that the company was indebted to him to the extent of \$455,356, filed before the Federal District Court Friday a supplemental and amended bill of complaint, listing the various properties of the railway company and asking that if the company is unable to pay its indebtedness, that the properties be sold to satisfy creditors, costs of court and other legal action. Harrison D. Emerson was recently appointed receiver of the company.

In his first petition the libellant claimed the railway company was indebted to him for 254 original first mortgage bonds, worth \$1,000 each, a separate mortgage note for \$180,000, and further indebted to him for \$15,000. Since the notes matured and the company failed to pay the bonds, he asked that a receiver be appointed.

#### NAVAL STATION NOTES.

The United States Coast Guard cutter "Comanche," now on duty at Galveston, Texas, will come to the Naval Station to dock and undergo repairs. This work will probably be done by the station force.

The dock trial of the "Nashville" will be held some time this week to determine under sailing conditions the condition of the present overhaul period. The vessel will be placed in full commission and leave New Orleans the first of the coming week for Mexican waters.

The Heald Bank, Light Ship, arrived at the station yesterday for an examination to determine the amount of repairs needed.

Authority has been granted by the department for the docking of six United Fruit Company vessels. The dates will be determined later, depending on when the Sunflower and Gouldshoro are undocked.

#### LEAPS FROM WINDOW.

Tearing away a screen on the second floor of the main building at Charity Hospital late Monday evening, Ralph Gardino, farmer of Lower Coast, a typhoid patient, leaped through the window in a nude condition, crashed through the skylight of the shed between the main building and Delgado Memorial building, and landed on the marble walk, bleeding from a score of jagged cuts made by the glass. His condition is critical.

Had it not been that the skylight broke the force of the fall, Gardino would have been dashed to death on the stone walk. As it was, he was rendered unconscious for a time. Several nurses and attendants rushed to the man's side when they heard the crash of glass. A patient seated on the back steps of the building was slightly cut by a piece of flying glass. Gardino landed only a yard from him.

Gardino leaped to what looked like certain death before the eyes of a nurse and two attendants, who failed to catch up with him and prevent his act following an exciting chase through the corridor after the man had escaped from his guards, who were about to give him his bath.

Gardino awaited his chance while the attendants were preparing the bath. Delirious from the effects of high temperature, the farmer dashed through the door leading into the corridor when the attendants turned their backs for a fraction of a second. Members of Gardino's family were at his bedside. Physicians say his chances for recovery are not bright.
