TRUPIANO GETS BLACK HAND LETTER.
With the arrest of John Lavacke and Frank Montfre, Italian truck farmers living in St. Bernard parish, officials of that parish and New Orleans detectives are confident they have two members of a gang that has been distributing Black Hand letters in St. Bernard and in this city, causing terror among Italian residents. Letters threatening death and violence unless sums of money were paid have been sent dozens of Italians in this city and vicinity, but the police were unable to get a trace of the supposed guilty persons until Monday afternoon.

One Italian, after receiving several letters, became so frightened he left his home in St. Bernard with his family and came to live with his brother-in-law, Steve Trupiano, 1629 Patterson street.

He had been living there several weeks, but two more letters followed him. Trupiano, the brother-in-law, who conducts a saloon and grocery store, also received a letter in which the writer demanded \$200.

Trupiano went to Superintendent Reynolds Saturday afternoon, and an investigation was begun. The letter writers, apparently becoming desperate, and not satisfied with writing the "Black Hand" letters, called Trupiano on the telephone at his place of business early Monday afternoon. The voice was in Italian, and asked Trupiano if he had gotten any letters, the message was that his brother-in-law, Lichardo, must have ready the money demanded, as Monday was his last day to live.

Trupiano asked to whom he was to give the money, and the man on the other end of the wire told him to give it to one of his friends. The receiver was hung up, and Trupiano becoming alarmed, called on Deputy Sheriff Winfield, of Jefferson parish, who accompanied him to the office of Superintendent Reynolds. Detectives Methe and Ford, who already had been detailed to make an investigation of the case, were called into the office and told of the telephone message.

An automobile was obtained and Detective Ford and Methe, with the Jefferson deputy sheriff and Trupiano, started for St. Bernard parish, where they were to meet Sefruff Estopinal, who had been told of the conversation over the telephone by Superintendent Reynolds. The party in the automobile had gone but a short distance in St. Bernard when one of the tires on the car was punctured. This caused a delay of more than a half hour. While the tire was being repaired a man drove by in a wagon, and looked closely at the detectives and the deputy sheriff. Trupiano told them the man was Lavacke, alleged to have received the money from the Campagnas.

Lavacke drove his horse and wagon to a store, a short distance away, left his wagon, and returned to watch the detectives and the sheriff repair the tire. Detectives Methe and Ford advised Trupiano to go over and talk to Lavacke, but he declined to do so, saying he feared his life might be taken. The tire repaired, the party joined Sheriff Estopinal and Deputy Sheriffs Hahn and Serpass, and all went to the home of the Campagnas.

The letters written to Lichardo and Trupiano were compared with those received by one of the Campagnas, and the handwriting was pronounced identical. Believing Lavacke and Montfre had been instrumental in writing the letters, the detectives and St. Bernard officers went to their homes and put them under arrest. Both were lodged in the St. Bernard jail. They denied knowledge of the letters.
