Article I—The name and title of this corporation shall be the "Mutual Resource Development Company of Louisiana, Inc." and it shall exist and enjoy succession by its corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof; to contract, to sue and be sued; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to alter and break at pleasure; and to make and establish, as well as alter and amend, from time to time, such by-laws, rules and regulations, for the proper government of the affairs of this corporation as may be necessary and proper.

Article II—The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at twenty-five thousand (\$25,000.00) dollars, and shall be divided into two thousand five hundred (2500) shares of the par value of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each, and may be increased to one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars. Stock may be paid for in money, in services duly rendered to the corporation, or in property transferred to the corporation.

Article III—The object and purposes of this corporation are hereby declared to be any one or more of all of the following: To develop natural resources within the State of Louisiana by engaging in the sale, lease, purchase, or otherwise, of mineral deposits, lands and the products thereof, waters of the state and the use that may be made thereof, and that may be produced therefrom, and all other resources by which the state may be enriched and the general good promoted.

Article IV—The object and purposes of this corporation are hereby declared to be any one or more of all of the following: To develop natural resources within the State of Louisiana by engaging in the sale, lease, purchase, or otherwise, of mineral deposits, lands and the products thereof, waters of the state and the use that may be made thereof, and that may be produced therefrom, and all other resources by which the state may be enriched and the general good promoted.

Article V—No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts, debts or obligations of this corporation, nor shall the effect of rendering this charter null, or of exposing its stockholders to any liability beyond the unpaid balance due on the shares of stock owned by them, and in accordance with the further provisions as provided by Act No. 367 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1914.

Article VI—This act of incorporation may be changed, modified or altered, or this corporation may be dissolved, subject to the assent of the stockholders owning two-thirds of the issued stock of this corporation, at a meeting called by a notice of proper notice shall have been given to each of said stockholders, except whenever, in the judgment of the board of directors, it shall be deemed advisable and for the benefit of this corporation, that it should be dissolved, the board, within ten days after the adoption of a resolution to that effect, by a majority of the whole board at a meeting called for that purpose, of which meeting each director shall have received at least three days' notice, shall cause notice of the adoption of such resolution to be mailed to each stockholder, together with a notice of a meeting of the stockholders, to be held at the office of the corporation, to take action upon the resolution so adopted by the board of directors. In case of the dissolution of this corporation by the expiration of its charter, or otherwise, the stockholders shall elect three liquidators from among their number, who shall have full power and authority to liquidate and settle the business and affairs of the company, in case of death or inability of any of said liquidators, the survivor or survivors shall appoint a successor or successors to him or them.

Article VII—Until the election to be held on the second Tuesday of the month of January, 1917, the following stockholders shall constitute the first board of directors, to-wit: S. Holmes, Tallulah, Louisiana; Thomas J. Clay, Whitehouse P. O., La.; Donald Desjardins, Gretnawald, Louisiana; John W. Smith, Ward Bldg., Shreveport, Louisiana; C. W. Smith, Grunewald Hotel, New Orleans, La.

Article VIII—The capital stock of this corporation, after having been transferred from the corporation to a subscriber thereof, shall not be sold or transferred by the holder for sale or transfer by such subscriber, without first having offered such stock to this corporation and to the stockholders of this corporation at the then market or book value thereof, which market price shall be ascertained by the then prevailing market price for such stock, if such a price prevails at such time, when if not, the book value of such stock shall be ascertained either by an agreement of the parties, or by two competent and experienced business men, one to be chosen by the subscriber and the other by this corporation or the stockholders or stockholder, prospective purchaser, when if said two parties cannot agree upon a book value, such two parties so chosen to choose a third party, when the majority opinion shall prevail. In the event of the demise of a holder or holders of the stock of this corporation, the administrator, executor or representative of his estate to immediately tender such stock to this corporation and the stockholders thereof on the same terms as the holder or tender to be made by the holder or holders of such stock to this corporation and the stockholders thereof, when if they do not such stock might be purchased by such stockholders so desiring to acquire same. To such extent all stock as issued by this corporation shall be non-negotiable.

Article IX—The subscribers hereto have written opposite their respective names, the amount of stock in this corporation subscribed by each of them.
