## 1-CENT FERRY FARE NEW FEATURES THIS WEEK

To Be Recommended For New Third District Ferry Franchise.

Upset Price To Be Reduced From \$750.00 to \$100.00 Is Another Recommendation.

New Schedule To Go Into Effect With Expiration Of Canal Street Lease.

Algiers, La., Feb. 27, 1917.

A meeting of the committee appointed by the chairman under authority of resolutions passed at a meeting of citizens of the Fifth District January 23, 1917, apropos the proposed sale of the Third District Ferry Franchise, was held at 8:00 p. m. Monday, February 26, 1917, at 500 Verret street, there being present:

Hon. Wm. J. Hennessey, F. C. Hymel, Geo. Herbert, Jr., A. Spitzfaden, Jr., Dr. C. V. Kraft and S. A. Eross.

Dr. Kraft presided, Mr. Eross acted as secretary.

The secretary presented and read a copy of the proposed specifications for the sale of the ferry franchise, and after full and deliberate discussion informally it was determined to recommend to the Commission Council the following changes in the specifications, viz:

The duration of the franchise to be for 15 years as stipulated in the specifications, at tariff rates the same as now prevail at the Canal Street ferry, but with certain changes in the tariff, as listed below, to be effective from and after the expiration of the Canal Street ferry franchise.

The franchise upset price to be \$100 instead of \$750.00.

The Ferry Company to be compelled to keep the driveways and approaches in condition satisfactory to the public at all times, and to furnish sufficient number of comfortable benches both in the ferry houses and on the boats to adequately accommodate the usual patronage at all times.

Sanitary drinking facilities to be provided and maintained in accordance with the regulations of the Board of Health.

Proper power facilities to be installed to assist teams in getting on or off boats when the grade on either side of the river exceeds 4 per cent.

Schedule of service to be as follows: 5 a. m. to 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. to 7 p. m., every 10 minutes; 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. and 7 p. m. to 12 midnight, every 15 minutes; 12 midnight to 5 a. m., every 30 minutes.

Tariff rates to be as follows:

Pedestrians, 100 tickets for \$1, or 1 cent a ticket. Double fare after midnight until 5 a. m.

School children free between 7:30 a. m. and 5 p. m. on school days.

2-wheel vehicle and driver, 10c. 2-horse vehicle 20c.

1 animal and driver, 5c. each additional animal 5c.

1 horse carriage, wagon or tallyho, 10c.

3-horse vehicle, 30c. Lumber wagons, 40c.

Auto, 2 persons 10c, 4 persons 15c, 5 persons 20c, 6 persons or over 25c.

Runabout auto truck, 10c. 2 to 5 ton truck 20c.

Over five ton truck, 50c. Freight packages, all kinds, ordinary, 100 lbs. or under, 5c, 100 to 200 lbs. 10c.

Wheelbarrows, 5c. Same rates to apply whether loaded or unloaded. A penalty clause to be incorporated in the franchise which will insure redress of complaints by the public for non-compliance with the franchise conditions.

The secretary was instructed to call a meeting of all the members who were present at the initial meeting held January 23, 1917, said meeting to be on Friday, March 2, 1917, at 500 Verret street, for the purpose of approving the recommendations of this committee and perfecting plans for a mass meeting to secure the approval of the general public before presenting the suggestions to the Commission Council.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
