FATHER DEFENDS ENSIGN KOPPEL

Believes Troubles of Young Officer Will be Cleared Satisfactorily.

The statement made to the authorities at Washington that Ensign Harwood Koppel, attached to the gunboat Castine, had told her commander he had embezzled money of the city of New Orleans, and had asked to be sent home that he might make restitution, surprised Koppel's friends, the more so that he had never been in a position to embezzle funds. He was a clerk in the auditor's department.

George Koppel, the father, said his son had obtained a commission as ensign by individual effort, and without political influence of any sort, and surprised his friends by giving up a more lucrative position to join the navy. The father added:

"He volunteered the first or second day that the navy recruiting office was opened here, and although stating that he had no naval experience, was told that he could be made use of as an intelligence officer, his previous experience as a reporter on various papers fitting him for that purpose.

"After thorough examination by the naval authorities, he was given a commission as ensign and attached to the naval station at Algiers. The commandant found him useful in drilling recruits, as he had had previous military experience. He performed his duty satisfactorily for several months and received the commendation of his superior officers there.

"When the Castine was ready to sail they needed one more ensign and he was asked to volunteer, which he did. A week's service at sea proved to him that he erred in accepting that duty, as he had no sea training whatever. And he registered a transfer to land service again, which was disapproved, although recommended by the captain of his ship.

"His father and friends have no doubt that the matter will be cleared up satisfactorily to the Navy Department and to his many friends here, who have no doubt of his honesty."

Dispatches from Washington and other newspaper articles regarding Koppel and his affairs are as follows: Washington, Sept. 1.—Ensign Harwood Koppel, on board the Castine, a gun boat of the Atlantic fleet, an embezzler of the city funds of New Orleans?

The commander of the Castine has informed the Navy Department that Koppel has confessed and has asked to be sent home that he may make restitution.

Mayor Behrman of New Orleans, who is in Washington, says it is impossible that Koppel could have taken any funds belonging to the city.

The Navy Department is mystified. It has ordered Koppel back to the United States for an investigation. If it is found he is telling the truth, he probably will be dismissed from the service and if it is found he told an untruthful story in order to be sent home, his punishment will be dismissal. Koppel is a former member of the Louisiana Legislature.

He was employed in the office of the city auditor in New Orleans, but never, according to Mayor Behrman, had access to any of the city funds.

His father, George Koppel, in New Orleans, has received dispatches from the son saying his arrest is all a mistake and that he is heart-broken. The captain of the Castine, however, declares Koppel voluntarily confessed to taking money from the city.

Friends in New Orleans who know of the efforts of Mr. Koppel to get out of the navy scout the idea that he has taken any funds from the city. He handled none. They think he merely told the story in the hope that he might be enabled to obtain his release.

Ensign Koppel's father Saturday issued a statement denying published statements that he got the ensign post through politics. As a matter of fact, young Koppel quit a job paying more money than that of ensign and stood and passed examinations in the navy station here. When the gunboat left New Orleans it was an ensign short and Koppel volunteered to go with the understanding that he would be transferred to land duty as soon as possible.

Louis Ernest Robinson and Frederick Quereux, Jr., both of New Orleans, and residents of the City of New Orleans, hereinafter appearing and acting in their capacities of president and secretary, respectively, of the German-American Home-Steading Company, a corporation organized under the laws of this State, and which company, by its charter as amended, is authorized to acquire, hold, lease, and dispose of real estate in the Parish of Orleans, Louisiana, and to sell, lease, and otherwise dispose of the same, and to issue bonds, notes, and other securities, and to mortgage, hypothecate, and otherwise encumber the same, and to execute and perform all such acts and things as may be necessary and proper to carry out the objects and purposes of said corporation.
