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CHARTERS.

OF EDWARDS MOTOR CO., INC. State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

Be it known, That on this twenty-seventh day of October, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, before me, William Waller Young, a notary public in and for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, duly commissioned and qualified, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned: Personally came and appeared:

The several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, all above the full age of majority, who severally declared that availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana, and especially the laws relative to the organization of corporations, they have covenanted and agreed to bind themselves and constitute themselves, as well as all such other persons as may hereafter join or become associated with them, into a corporation and body politic in law, for the objects and purposes under the articles, agreements and stipulations following, to-wit:

Article I.—The name, style and title of this corporation shall be Edwards Motor Co., Inc., and under that name, it shall have and enjoy all the rights, advantages and franchises granted by law to corporations, and shall exist for the full term and period of ninety-nine (99) years from this day. It shall have power to contract, sue and be sued to make and use any bonds, notes and the same to alter and break at pleasure; to hold, receive, lease, purchase, sell and convey, as well as mortgage, hypothecate and pledge property, real, personal and mixed, corporeal and incorporeal; to name and appoint such managers, directors, officers, agents and other employees as it may deem expedient for the proper management and government of the affairs of said corporation.

Article II.—The domicile of this corporation is hereby fixed in the City of New Orleans, State of Louisiana, and all citation or other legal process shall be served upon the President of said corporation, or, in his absence, upon its Secretary-Treasurer.

Article III.—The objects and purposes of this corporation, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be:

To buy, sell, repair, and generally deal in automobiles, automobile trucks, and other motor-driven vehicles and bicycles and automobile and bicycle supplies, and all other business incidental to the retail and wholesale automobile, automobile truck, and bicycle business; to promote and assist financially any person, firm or corporation engaged in the business of selling automobiles, automobile trucks and other motor-driven vehicles at retail or wholesale; to accept in pledge automobiles, automobile trucks, or other motor-driven vehicles for any loan or security; to purchase, acquire, keep and store said automobiles, automobile trucks, and other motor-driven vehicles pending their redemption; with the right and power to do any and all things which are connected with, or in any manner incidental or complementary to the objects and purposes herein set forth.

Article IV.—The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00), to be divided into and represented by one hundred (100) shares, each of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. The capital stock of this corporation may be increased to the sum of one hundred thousand (\$100,000.00) dollars.

Article V.—All the corporate powers of said corporation shall be exercised by a Board of Directors, consisting of not less than three, and not more than five stockholders, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The Board of Directors shall elect annually from their number a President, Vice-President and a Secretary-Treasurer.

The first Board of Directors shall consist of three stockholders, and shall be composed of John K. Edwards, George H. Edwards and Edwin W. Edwards, with John K. Edwards, as President, Edwin W. Edwards, as Vice-President, and George H. Edwards, as Secretary-Treasurer.

The post office addresses of said directors are as follows: John K. Edwards, 3801 Canal Street, New Orleans, La.; George H. Edwards, P. O. Box 117, Bay St. Louis, Miss.; Edwin W. Edwards, P. O. Box 277, Gulfport, Miss.

These directors and officers shall serve until the second Wednesday of September, 1918, or until their successors have been duly elected and qualified. The annual meeting of stockholders or the election of directors shall be held on the second Wednesday in September of each year, unless said day be a legal holiday, and then on the next day thereafter. Each subscriber hereto sets after his name his post office address and a statement of the number of shares of stock which he agrees to take in the corporation.

Article VI.—In the event of the liquidation or dissolution of this corporation, the stockholders shall elect two liquidators from among their number, at a meeting convened for that purpose, after ten days' written notice sent to each stockholder by mail, to his last known address; said liquidators shall have the authority to wind up the business and affairs of this corporation.

In case of death of either of said liquidators, the survivor shall appoint a stockholder as successor to him.

Article VII.—This charter may be modified, changed or altered, or said corporation may be dissolved with the assent of stockholders owning two-thirds of the entire capital stock, at a general meeting of the stockholders convened for such purpose, after ten days' written notice has been given to each stockholder, mailed to him at his last known address.

Article VIII.—No subscriber for stock shall ever be held liable for the contracts, debts or debts of said corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance, if any, due the corporation of the stock for which he has subscribed; nor shall any stockholder ever be held liable for such contracts, debts or debts in any further sum than the unpaid balance, if any, on the stock owned by him; nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering any subscriber liable beyond the unpaid amount, if any, remaining due on his stock.

Article IX.—This corporation is organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, and especially Act No. 207 of 1914, and the subscribers hereto, for themselves and said corporation, and for its officers, directors and stockholders, hereby in full acceptance of this charter, and as conditions of this corporation, all the rights, powers, privileges and franchises granted to corporations, and granted to and conferred upon officers, directors and stockholders of corporations by said laws and said act; such acceptance being as full, complete and binding as if said rights, powers, privileges, and immunities were set forth at full length in this instrument.

Article X.—The subscription of thirty-three (33) shares of this corporation by John K. Edwards and Edwin W. Edwards to the capital stock of this corporation, has been paid for by them by the transfer to the corporation of the real property described in the attached inventory, which property is now appraised by the Board of Directors of this corporation at the sum of nine thousand and sixty-six and 66 2/3-100 (\$9,066.66 2/3) dollars; all as will more fully appear by reference to the act of sale, transferring said property to the corporation, passed before the undersigned notary, this day; and the subscription of thirty-four (34) shares of the said John K. Edwards, to the capital stock of this corporation, has been paid for by him by the transfer and delivery to this corporation of the movable property described in the said attached inventory; which property is now appraised by the Board of Directors of this corporation at three thousand, four hundred (\$3,400.00) dollars. The inventory, which refers to the contents of an accurate, detailed and itemized description of the property to be transferred, as aforesaid, and is annexed hereto as part hereof, and is subscribed "No. 1917" by the undersigned notary, for identification herewith.

Thus done and passed, in my notarial office, in the city of New Orleans aforesaid, in the presence of George H. Terriberry and Frazer L. Rice, competent witnesses of lawful age, and residing in this city, who herewith subscribe their names, together with said parties and me, notary, on the day and date set forth in the caption hereof.

JOSE RUIZ DIES IN SPAIN. Requiem Mass was sung at the Church of the Holy Name of Mary Monday morning at 7 o'clock, for the repose of the soul of the late Jose Ruiz, who died at Santander, Spain, on Nov. 18. He was 50 years old and had lived in Algiers for 30 years, having returned to Spain the early part of the year. Mr. Ruiz had been in health for sometime and left here several months ago in search of health. He was one of our most prosperous business men and was a member of the firm of M. Abascal & Bro. He was a nephew of Andreas P. Abascal and a cousin of Arthur and Aniceto Ruiz.
