TULANE THEATER.

ALGIER BRANCH RED CROSS.

The Algiers Branch of the New Orleans Chapter, American Red Cross, held its regular monthly meeting in the Knights of Columbus Hall

on Monday, November 26, at 7:30 p. m.

There was a large attendance and those who had attended the Red Cross Convention on the 22nd and 23rd instant had much of interest to relate. From all accounts the convention was both educational and inspirational in its effect.

Ten new names were added to the roll, which brings the membership up to 166.

The record of work accomplished during the month is 150 garments and 38 sweaters. Of these last 25 were sent to headquarters, 25 more will be sent over on Thanksgiving, and in another ten days 50 more will be knitted.

The knitting class now numbers 42. The call from the chapter is for "more and more sweaters," therefore the urgency of still further increasing the number of knitters is apparent.

We regret to announce that the opening of the surgical dressings class is again postponed until further notice. This is made necessary by the new regulations governing the instruction of branches recently adopted. These new regulations are now being prepared and will be sent out by the Gulf Division of the American Red Cross to all branches within a week or ten days.

ACT OF INCORPORATION OF BRAUD HARDWOOD LUMBER CO., INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

Be it known, That on this, the 24th day of the month of November, 1917, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-second, before Charles F. Fletchinger, a notary public duly commissioned and qualified in and for the city, parish and state aforesaid, therein residing, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared that, availing themselves of the provisions of this State relative to the formation and organization of corporations, they have covenanted and agreed, and do, by these presents, covenant, themselves, their heirs, assigns, as well as those who may hereafter become associated with them, to form themselves into a corporation for the objects and purposes, with the name and objects of the following to-wit:

Article I.—The name and style of this corporation shall be Braud Hardwood Lumber Co., Inc., and by said corporate name it shall and lawfully may, during its existence for a period of ninety-nine years, unless sooner dissolved, and shall have all the rights, privileges and immunities which are now or hereafter may be granted by law to corporations of the same kind and character, and under said corporate name it shall have power and authority to contract, sue and be sued, to hold real and personal property, to make, break or alter at pleasure, and to make all necessary rules and regulations for its corporate management and control.

Article II.—The domicile of this corporation shall be in the City of New Orleans, Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, and all other legal processes shall be served upon the Secretary of this corporation, or its agent, at its principal office, or absence or inability to act, upon any other officer of the corporation.

Article III.—The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized are, to-wit: to manufacture hardwood and other lumber, and the products thereof; to buy and sell timber, sawlogs, lumber and other forest products; to acquire by purchase or otherwise, and to own and operate sawmills, planing mills, and other manufacturing plants germane to its business; to acquire by purchase or otherwise, and to own and operate logging roads, tram ways, skidders, log skows, barges and other water craft in connection with its business, but not as a common carrier; to own and operate commissaries for the sale by retail of all the products of such sawmills and things connected with or appertaining to the manufacture and sale of lumber and other wood products as are or may be germane to the objects and purposes above expressed.

Article IV.—The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars, divided into fifty (50) shares of the par value of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars each, all of which shall be common stock, and the amount to which the capital stock may be increased is hereby fixed at the sum of fifty thousand (\$50,000) Dollars; the said stock shall be issued only for cash or in payment of property or services actually received by the corporation; said corporation; said stock shall be fully paid at the time of its issuance and there shall be no non-assessable shares.

This corporation shall commence business and become a going concern as soon as the whole of its Five thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or part thereof, shall have been subscribed and paid for.

The parties to this act hereby declare that they subscribe for the number of shares of the capital stock of said corporation, set opposite their respective signatures hereto, and that this act of incorporation shall serve as the original subscription.

Edward R. Braud, one of the said subscribers to the extent of Forty-seven shares of the capital stock of said corporation, in full payment and liquidation of said subscription, do hereby convey, transfer, assign and set over and deliver to this corporation all of his right, title and interest in and to those two certain timber contracts hereto attached as follows:

First. All the right, claims, title and interest acquired by E. R. Braud from C. F. Borah in and to that certain contract dated October 17, 1910, between W. H. Slaydon, of the first part, and A. G. Little, of the second part, the interest of the said A. G. Little in said contract being assigned by the Nicholas Lumber & Manufacturing Co., on March 16, 1917, and the interest of the Nicholas Lumber & Manufacturing Co. being conveyed to Chas. F. Borah, on April 9, 1917, which assignment together with certified copy of the original contract, were recorded on April 11, 1917, in Conveyance Book 62, p. 411, on the records of the Parish of St. Tammany.

Second. All the right, title, claim and interest of the said E. R. Braud in and to that certain contract dated Oct. 20, 1916, between A. G. Little and J. T. Colinger, J. S. Sexton and George W. Covington, the rights to which contract have by various assignments passed upon the said E. R. Braud, the original contract being filed for recordation in the office of W. E. Blossman, Dy. Clerk and Ex-officio Recorder, at Covington, on March 9, 1917, said contract covering timber on what is known as the "Hatchers Tract."

The said Edward R. Braud, John T. Colinger, Thomas D. Mobley, Clark W. Storrs and Byrd H. Mobley comprise the members of the Board of Directors of this corporation in accordance with the requirements of the law and Statute Act No. 267 of 1914, of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana, hereby value and appraise the right, title and interest of the said Edward R. Braud in and to the timber contracts aforesaid at the sum of Forty-seven hundred (\$4,700) Dollars.

No present or future stockholder of this corporation shall ever sell, assign or transfer, other than by inheritance, any of the capital stock of this corporation until the same shall have been first offered to the remaining stockholders for the benefit of those stockholders who may desire to purchase the same through the Board of Directors, for a period of ten days, at the book value of the stock and shown by the records of the corporation, on the 31st day of December, preceding the date of such offer. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors, promptly upon receiving an offer of sale of any of the capital stock of this corporation, to communicate the same to the stockholders in writing, through the Secretary of the Company, and each of the said stockholders shall be entitled to purchase such proportion of the stock so offered for sale as the number of shares owned by all other stockholders desiring to participate in the purchase. No sale under foreclosure, attachment or other process, or by virtue of any power of attorney, pledge or other instrument, validly made until the foregoing requirements have been complied with by the purchaser, shall be valid or binding upon the corporation, and the Board of Directors shall have authority, however, to receive the above requirements as to any particular hypothecation or pledge of stock, by

resolution adopted at a regular called meeting of the Board, or a meeting attended by all the members of the Board of Directors, such resolution being adopted in advance of the pledge or hypothecation.

Article V.—All the powers of this corporation shall be vested in and be exercised by a Board of not less than three (3) nor more than seven (7) directors, as determined in advance each year by the stockholders at the annual meeting. Each director shall be a bona-fide stockholder, and shall own at all times One (1) full paid, non-pledged share of stock. The first Board of Directors shall consist of:

Edward R. Braud, Nicholson, Mississippi; John T. Colinger, Nicholson, Mississippi; Thomas D. Mobley, 735 Union St., New Orleans, La.; Clark W. Storrs, 7227 Hampson St., New Orleans, La.; Byrd H. Mobley, Nicholson, Mississippi.

The first officers of the corporation, with their addresses, are as follows: Edward R. Braud, Nicholson, Mississippi, who shall be President; John T. Colinger, Nicholson, Mississippi, who shall be Vice-President; Thomas D. Mobley, 735 Union St., Orleans, Louisiana, who shall be Secretary.

Clark W. Storrs, New Orleans, Louisiana, who shall be Treasurer.

The above Board of Directors shall hold office until the first annual meeting in February, 1918, or until their successors are elected and qualified. Each succeeding board shall continue to hold office until the next year or until their successors are elected and qualified. The persons to be hereafter elected directors for subsequent years shall select from their own number, President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. The Board of Directors may from time to time, and as the business of the corporation may dictate, combine any two of the above officers in one and the same person.

On the second Tuesday of February of each year, unless the same should fall on a legal holiday, then upon the next following day day, the stockholders shall elect a board of directors for the ensuing year. The board of directors, as well as the officers already installed shall continue in office until their successors are elected and qualified. The election of directors shall be by ballot and the person receiving the majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected. For electing directors, or for any other purpose each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote, whether or not the stock is held in full or in part. A majority of the directors voting at any one time, in person or by proxy, shall be required to pass any resolutions or adopt any by-law, and which, when so adopted, shall be valid, corporate acts. In case of vacancy on the Board or among the officers from any cause the remaining members of the Board shall have the power to fill such vacancy. Said Board of Directors shall have the power to enact such by-laws, rules and regulations as they may deem necessary and proper for the management, operation and control of the business of said corporation.

Article VI.—Notice of all meetings of stockholders held for the election of directors, or for any other purpose, shall be given in writing by the Secretary and may be served personally or deposited in the mail addressed fifteen (15) days before such meeting is held, and directed to each stockholder at his last known address, as the same shall appear upon the books of the corporation, unless said notice is waived in writing by any of the stockholders appearing upon the books. At all meetings of stockholders a majority of the votes cast shall be sufficient to elect and decide all questions voted upon, except for the alteration, amendment or the dissolution of the corporation.

Article VII.—This act of incorporation may be altered, amended, or modified, or the corporation dissolved by a vote of two-thirds in amount of the capital stock represented at a general meeting of the stockholders, called for that purpose, after notice as provided in Article VI of this charter; and in case of dissolution of the corporation the stockholders at such meeting shall elect three (3) Liquidating Commissioners, who shall have entire charge of such liquidation, with authority to sell and dispose of the assets of the corporation, and to fill vacancies occurring in their number.

Article VIII.—No stockholders shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of the corporation in any further sum, than the unpaid balance due the corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any mere informality in organization have the effect of rendering sign charter, null, or exposing a stockholder to any liability beyond the amount of his unpaid stock.
