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CHARTER

OF INDUSTRIAL MANUFACTURING COMPANY, INCORPORATED.

United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans.

Be it known, That on this twenty-second day of the month of December, in the year of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and seventeen, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and forty-second before me, Oscar Schreiber, notary public, duly commissioned and qualified, within and for the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared: the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declared, having read and understood the contents of the instrument hereunto annexed, and the provisions of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana and of the laws of said State relative to the organization of corporations, and particularly of the provisions of Act No. 267 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1914, that they have consented and agreed and united to form and do, by these presents, contract and agree and bind and obligate themselves to form and organize themselves, as well as all such other persons who may hereafter join or become associated with them or their successors, into a stock corporation and body politic in law, for the objects and purposes hereinafter set forth, and to the stipulations and agreements of the articles following, to-wit:

Article I.—The name and title of this corporation shall be "Industrial Manufacturing Company, Incorporated," and under and by said name, unless sooner dissolved in accordance with law and this charter, it shall exist, transact business, sue and be sued, and shall have and enjoy the same corporate existence and succession for a period of ninety-nine (99) years from and after the date of this act. It may have, hold, receive, buy, sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of, real, personal or mixed, corporeal or incorporeal, movable or immovable, all subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by law.

Section 1.—To make, issue and endorse bonds or notes and other evidences of debt. It may accept mortgages, pledges or other forms of security for money loaned or other debts. It may contract, sue and be sued, plead or be pleaded by its corporate name in any court of competent jurisdiction. It may make, adopt and use common seal and alter the same at pleasure. It may hold stock in other corporations, and its capital stock may be issued for capital stock in other corporations. It may name, appoint, employ, discharge, and may fix their compensation, having due regard to the nature, character, and value of their services. It may make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations not inconsistent with this charter or any existing law, fixing or altering the management of its property, the regulation and government of its affairs, and in the manner of the certification and registration.

Section 2.—To store, transport and sell all and any of the said products above specified and for the convenient conduct of the same, it may be found necessary and desirable to acquire and use, operate, sell, assign, transfer and otherwise dispose of, processes, formulas, patents, licenses and other rights in any and all inventions or improvements, whether secured or not, under letters patent, and to do such other things as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the purposes of this charter.

Section 3.—To survey, subdivide, and plat lands for the purpose of lease or sale, and to improve and develop the same by the erection of houses or buildings thereon and to do such other lawful acts as may be necessary or desirable in and about the improvement and development thereof for any purpose; to plan, grow and cultivate all kinds of fruits, plants and vegetables; to raise, buy, sell and deal in horses, mules, cattle, live stock and poultry of all kinds, and generally to engage in the business of a planter.

Section 4.—To carry on all allied and associated lines of business which may be directly connected with or may further and assist the conduct of its main business as above specified.

Section 5.—To construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire and own, maintain and operate, steamboats, sailing vessels, barges and other water craft, piers, docks, wharves and such lines of tramway or railway as may be necessary or convenient to the operation of any business or enterprise of the corporation, with all necessary side-tracks, locomotives, cars, depots, round houses and other equipment necessary to the operation of such vessels, piers, docks, wharves, tramways or railways and the traffic thereon; provided that this corporation shall not, without the consent of the State, be a common carrier or have the right to exercise the power of eminent domain.

Section 7.—To enter into, make, perform and carry out contracts of every kind not prohibited by law.

Section 8.—No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be liable for or responsible in any further sum than the unpaid balance on the stock for which he has subscribed, nor shall he be liable for the payment of any debt or liability of this corporation, whether incurred before or after the expiration of the term of said stock, if he has not sold the same in the open market.

Article II.—The domicile of this corporation shall be in the Parish of Orleans, State of Louisiana, and all citations or other legal process shall be served upon the President of this corporation, or in his absence, upon the Vice-President, or in the absence of both of these officers, upon the Secretary of this corporation.

Article III.—The objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be: To manufacture, produce, adapt, buy, sell, import, export, and generally deal and trade, either at wholesale or retail, in real and personal property of every kind and description, and particularly all vegetables and other products, compounds and derivations carrying high percentages of sugars, starches and oils, including refined, waste, denatured alcohol and other spirits and oils, together with foods, fertilizers and other by-products incident to and arising from such manufacture and by-products and any and all ingredients, products and compounds of any of the foregoing substances, and any other business which may be found necessary and desirable to carry out the purposes of this charter.

Section 3.—To apply for, purchase or otherwise acquire and use, operate, sell, assign, transfer and otherwise dispose of, processes, formulas, patents, licenses and other rights in any and all inventions or improvements, whether secured or not, under letters patent, and to do such other things as may be necessary or convenient to carry out the purposes of this charter.

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
