The following circular letter has been received by the principal: Permission has been granted the School Lunch Guild or any other reliable organization to sell ice cream and other eatables provided the following rules are carried out: Ice cream must be obtained in block form and sold in original packages. Bulk ice cream should not be permitted as it affords too many opportunities for contamination in the process of dispensing. All dishes that might be used after being thoroughly cleansed with soap and water should be rinsed in running water; that no cream pies, cream puffs, or any other product containing cream in any form be sold; that no ice cream be kept from day to day, and that any amount remaining unsold in one day should be removed from the school; that milk should not be sold unless it is dispensed in original one-half pint bottles properly sealed, or if dispensed from quart bottles, should be in child's individual drinking cup or in sanitary drinking cups; that all pastry products should be kept in a glass case or in a screen case; that all sandwiches, if made outside of the school should be wrapped in individual napkins.


