



ARTICLE I.—The name and title of this corporation shall be the Victory Tea and Coffee Company, Incorporated. It shall exist and enjoy a succession of its corporate name for a period of ninety-nine years from date hereof, with all the rights and powers now or hereafter conferred by law upon similar corporations. Its domicile shall be in the City of New Orleans, Parish of Orleans, and the principal office of the corporation shall be served upon the President and in the event of his absence upon the Vice-President or Secretary and Treasurer, in the ordinary course of business, and shall be sued, to make and use a corporate seal; to purchase and receive, lease, hold, sell, convey, as well as mortgage and hypothecate property, real, personal and mixed, to name and appoint such officers and agents as the interest of the corporation may require and to make and establish such by-laws and regulations for the proper management and regulation of its affairs as may be deemed necessary; and the same to change and alter at pleasure.  
ARTICLE 2.—The capital stock of this corporation is fixed at five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00); which said stock shall be divided and represented by fifty shares of the par value of one hundred dollars, each. Said stock may be paid for in cash or services rendered or in property regularly transferred to the corporation.  
ARTICLE III.—The objects and purposes and the nature of the business to be carried on by this corporation are hereby declared to be, to buy and sell coffee, tea, molasses, grain, cereals and every other kind of merchandise or commodities whatsoever. To roast, grind and pack coffee and teas to prepare in any manner all kinds of merchandise which the said corporation may deem advisable for the carrying on of its business; which may be incidental or connected with the carrying out of its objects and purposes as stated herein.  
ARTICLE IV.—The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of three directors, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The meeting of the stockholders shall be held annually on the first Monday in June, at the office of the Company, if said date falls on a holiday then the annual meeting shall take place on the following Monday. The officers of the corporation shall be a President, Vice-President and Secretary and Treasurer. Until the election to be held in June, 1921 the following named stockholders shall constitute the first Board of Directors: John J. Finnessey, Albert S. Cassanova, Andrew Reinhard, said John J.
