Walsh, of New York City the Supreme Regent of the Order enjoys the unique honor of being the only woman who ever was granted the privilege of addressing the Supreme Council Knights of Columbus, then in session at Buffalo, N. HAMILTON JACKSON, ALHAMBRA PORTER, KILLED BY WOMAN

Hamilton Jackson, the negro porter, of the Alhambra Gymnastic Club was no doubt better known in Algiers than any other colored man, having served efficiently as the porter of the Alhambra Gymnastic Club for several years. The shooting occurred Monday evening about 8:15 at the Club rooms of the Alhambra and according to Hamilton's own statement taken by Corporal Hyde at the Charity Hospital the woman, Rebecca Perries, residing at 440 De Armas Street was completely exonerated.

In his statement before death he said that his friend Rebecca, as he called her, was in the club room with him and he went to his locker to get some of his clothes and in doing so he took his pistol from one of the pockets and handed it to Rebecca. During the conversation the weapon was accidentally discharged causing the fatal accident. In making his statement to the police he said that Rebecca had been a close friend of his for some time, that she had merely come to the club to see him and that there should be no blame attached to her in the matter. After the shooting occurred Jackson ran without assistance, more than two squares to the residence of Dr. J. E. Pollock, who at once ordered that he be sent to the hospital for treatment. Jackson's wife was buried one week ago today.

The members of the Alhambra Gymnastic Club thought a great deal of Jackson. He was always polite, sober, reliable, truthful and his sudden death was greatly regretted by many of the white people who had dealings with him.

LOCAL PLAYGROUNDS MAKES GOOD SHOWING.

Algiers Playground proved itself to be one of the foremost playgrounds of the city last week when 73 per cent of girls tested and 18 per cent of boys tested qualified in the requirements of the Physical Efficiency Tests. These tests consist of all-up relay, goal throwing and 25-yd. dash for girls and chiming the bar, standing broad jump and running for the boys.

Physical Directors J. Alf. Rousseau and Miss May Fleming visited the playground last Friday to make the tests and they expressed themselves as delighted with the results when twenty-five girls out of thirty-four and ten boys out of fifty-four competing qualified. The reason for the girls exceeding the boys in the percentage qualifying is that the boys' requirements are more difficult to make than are the girls' requirements. The two physical directors complimented Miss Grace Lennox, Supervisor of the Algiers Playground, and Officer Robert Williams upon the good showing their girls and boys made in the tests.

The Algiers girls and boys also were praised by the Physical Directors for their aptitude in swimming and diving and their enthusiasm in playing the games of water baseball and water basketball, which were introduced in the Algiers tank this summer.

Following are the requirements in each class of the Physical Efficiency Tests:

Boys.

55-Inch Class—Fifty yards, 6 4-5 seconds; Pull up chinning, 6 times; Standing Broad jump, 5 feet 9 inches.

59-Inch Class—Sixty yards, 7 4-5 seconds; Pull up chinning 8 times; Standing broad jump, 6 feet 3 inches.

63-Inch Class—One hundred yards 12 1-5 seconds; Pull up chinning 10 times; Standing broad jump, 7 feet. Unlimited Height—One hundred yards, 12 1-5 seconds; Pull up chinning, 15 times; Standing broad jump, 8 feet.

Girls.

55-Inch Class—All-up Indian club relay race, 30 feet, 30 seconds; Basketball goal throwing, 2 goals 6 trials; Twenty-five-yard dash, 4 2-5 seconds.

59-Inch Class—All-up Indian club relay race, 30 feet, 25 seconds; Basketball goal throwing, 3 goals, 7 trials; Twenty-five-yard dash, 4 1-5 seconds.

63-Inch Class—All-up Indian club relay race, 30 feet, 25 seconds; Basketball goal throwing, 5 goals, 9 trials; Twenty-five-yard dash, 4 seconds.

Note—All-up Indian club relay race, 30 feet, girls run this distance three round trips, or a distance of 60 yards, or 180 feet.

The growth of this school has been phenomenal. In Sept. 1917, when the school was first opened, the grading was to the 5th Grade B only, 78 pupils and two teachers, while today the corps consists of seven.

The prospects of a much larger enrollment are in evidence, as this section is rapidly improving.

McDONOUGH No. 4.

The opening day of this session was a very favorable one in the annals of McDonough No. 4, the total enrollment being 100 pupils, a larger number than we enrolled last year on the first day.

Three teachers were welcomed as new members of the excellent faculty, Misses Marion Morse, Elda Lange and Moffat. We hope that they will be very successful in their chosen profession.

The new manual training room is nearing completion and we feel certain that it will prove a valuable addition to the school and will improve that branch of our school course.

The free text books were distributed Monday and regularly been done daily.
