THRIFT IN LITTLE THINGS.

China and all crockery is so costly now that we must of necessity take care of the household supply.

Use triplicate dishes on one burner to save gas; the heat of the burner will cook three things in nearly the time used for one.

If making ginger bread, add a cupful of cold coffee instead of the boiling water; save the coffee and improve the cake.
