Magnet Has Many Uses.

A highly important use of a magnet is that in which it is sometimes employed to withdraw small pieces of iron from such out of the way places as the human eye. Another use of the tractive force of magnetism on a much larger scale was that to which it was put by Edison in his magnetic ore separator, in which the ore, previously crushed to a fine powder, is dropped down a chute past the poles of p erful electro-magnets, in passing which the iron particles of the ore are deflected to one side, while the nonmagnetic stone dust continues undeflected down the chute. Still another instance of the employment of magnetism in a small way is that in which a magnetized tack hammer is used in the manufacture of strawberry baskets on a large scale in conjunction with a mechanical device which presents the tacks, one at a time and head up, to the operative, thereby greatly facilitating his work.

The Wonders of America

By T. T. MAXEY

"THE CATHEDRAL OF COM-MERCE."

THE Woolworth building, New York city, the highest office building in all the world, is often referred to as "The Cathedral of Commerce." This marvelous building is 792 feet or 60 stories tall. About 8,000,000 human beings reside within the bird's-eye view visible from the observation gallery on the fifty-eighth floor. This view, so unusual, so wonderful, has attracted representatives from more than sixty different countries.

About four hundred feet of the outside of the upper portion of the tower is flood lighted at night. This causes the building to present a bold and im-posing spectacle—visible, 'tis said, 40 at sea. The structure weighs 223,000 tons, this tremendous weight being supported by 69 caissons, the largest 19 feet in diameter, all going down to bed rock or 110 feet below the sidewalk, Engineers claim its construction is so solid and safe that it would withstand a wind having a velocity of 200 miles per hour.

About 250 people are required to operate and maintain the building, which contains almost thirty acres of floor space. The tenants and their employ ees number about ten thousand. To serve them and those who enter to transact business with them, 28 elevators are required. About 25,000 people, on an average, ride in them daily. Approximately 250,000 p'eces of mail matter are delivered in the building daily. The two elevators which operate to the tower are the fastest elevators in the world, having a speed of 700 feet per minute.

A FEW VEGETABLE DISHES.

A steam cooker, or, lacking that, an old-fashioned steamer which fits the top of a kettle is an in-

valuable utensil for cooking. Vegetables which are steamed contain all the valuable mineral salts, the soluble nutritive materials which are thrown away when the vegetables are boiled and the water thrown away. It takes about a third longer

to steam vegetables, but it takes little fuel to keep the steamer in operation when once started. A whole dinner from vegetables to meat, fish and dessert, may be cooked together. Summer Squash en Casserole.—Take

two and one-half cupfuls of cooked squash, add three-fourths of a cupful of thick, stewed tomatoes, two ta-blespoonfuls of butter, one and onehalf teaspoonfuls of salt, one tablespoonful of grated onion, one-half cupful of chopped meat, fish, or nuts, mix well and cover with three-fourths cupful of buttered crumbs. Bake in a hot oven until well browned. Egg plant or carrots may be served in this dish in place of squash.

Roast Beef With Mexican Sauce, Reheat cold roast beef cut in thin slices in the following sauce: Cook one onion finely chopped in two tablespoonfuls of butter, five minutes. Add one red and one green pepper chopped. one clove of garlic also chopped, and two tomatoes cut in pieces. Cook fifteen minutes. Add one teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, one-fourth teaspoonful of celery salt and salt to

Tomatoes and Onions,-Take one quart of tomatoes and one quart of onions sliced. Stew the onions until about half done in as little water as possible, then add the tomatoes. Cook until tender. Add a liberal amount of olive oil or butter, season to taste with salt, and thicken with a little flour stirred with cream.

Eggs aux Tomatoes.-Put a half pint of tomato pulp well seasoned into a well-buttered baking dish. Add a tablespoonfut of butter, set into a hot oven for ten minutes then remove and add four eggs, added carefully to peach. Cook from three to four minutes and serve from the dish.
