AMENDMENT TO CHARTER OF GARCIA STATIONERY CO., LIMITED.
United States of America, State of Louisiana, Parish of Orleans, City of New Orleans. Be it known, that on this 12th day of the month of June in the year of our Lord one thousand, nine hundred and twenty-one, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the one hundred and forty-fifth, Before me—Charles I. Denechaud, a notary public duly commissioned and qualified, in and for the State and Parish aforesaid, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, Personally came and appeared: Joseph F. Garcia, President, and Charles F. Lambert, Secretary of the City of New Orleans, and the said Garcia Stationery Co., Ltd., a corporation created by and under the laws of the State of Louisiana by an act passed before W. Morgan Gurley, notary public on the 1st day of July, 1890, and recorded in the office of the Recorder of Mortgages for the Parish of Orleans, on the 3rd day of July 1890, in Book 255, folio 619. Who declared: That a general meeting of the stockholders of the said Garcia Stationery Co., Ltd., was held at the office of the said Company in the City of New Orleans on the Sixth day of the month of June 1921, at three o'clock, p. m., after due notice given to the stockholders thereof in writing as required by the charter of said corporation.
That at said general meeting of stockholders, held on said day, it was resolved by a unanimous vote of all of the stockholders and outstanding that Article V of the charter of said company be amended so as to read as follows, to-wit:

CHARTER.
Article V—All of the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and its business and affairs managed and directed by a board of directors, which shall be composed of seven members. They shall be elected from among the stockholders each year, at the annual meeting of the board of directors, and the directors so elected shall serve for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified.
The following named stockholders shall constitute the Board of Directors to serve until the first Monday in June, 1922, and until their successors are duly elected and qualified, to-wit: Joseph F. Garcia, 329 Camp St., New Orleans, La.; Henry J. Fremaux, 4609 Painters St., New Orleans, La.; Charles F. Lambert, 2234 Milan St., New Orleans, La.; Mrs. Joseph Garcia, 830 Audubon St., New Orleans, La.; Mrs. Charles F. Lambert, 2224 Milan St., New Orleans, La.; Mrs. Thomas S. Allen, 830 Audubon St., New Orleans, La., and Mrs. Harry Lea, Clinton, La. On the first Monday in June, 1922, and annually thereafter on the first Monday in June, an election of Directors shall be held at the office of the company after ten days notice in writing shall have been given to the stockholders by the Secretary. Regular meetings of the board of directors shall be held quarterly on the first Monday of June, September, December and March. Special meetings may be called by

the President or on the written request of three directors.
The majority of the members of the board of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but if at any meeting of the board there shall be less than a quorum present, the majority of those present may adjourn the meeting from time to time.
The officers of the corporation shall consist of a president, a vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, who shall be elected by the board of directors, on the day of their election and from their number the Office of secretary and treasurer may be held by one person.
Vacancies in the board of directors caused by resignation, death, sale or transfer of all stock in his name, or any other cause shall be filled by the other directors in office and such person or persons so elected shall hold office until the next meeting of stockholders and until their successors are elected and qualified.
The president of the corporation shall be the manager of the business conducted by said corporation and his agent shall be fixed by the board of directors, who shall also fix the salaries or compensation of the other officers of the corporation. The president and manager shall have power to employ and discharge all employees to make all laws for

the sale of merchandise, for printing and lithographic work. He shall make all contracts and engagements for the purchase of equipment. All purchases of machinery and supplies shall be made by the president and manager duly authorized by the board of directors.
All checks, as well as notes and other evidences of indebtedness of the corporation shall be signed by two officers of said corporation.
Each director shall be required to hold in his own name, at least one full paid and unpledged share of the capital stock of this corporation.
That at said meeting of stockholders of said Garcia Stationery Co., Ltd., it was further resolved that the president and the secretary and treasurer of said Company take the necessary steps required by law for the purpose of making effective the said amendment to the charter of said company, in accordance with the foregoing resolution.
And the said Joseph F. Garcia, President and the said Charles F. Lambert, Secretary and Treasurer, of the said Garcia Stationery Co., Ltd., declared that they do now appear for and on behalf of the said Garcia Stationery Co., Ltd., for the purpose of making effective the amendment of the stockholders in amending the charter of said Company, and they do now ask me, notary, to execute said amendment in authentic form to serve and avail as

the occasion may or shall require, to be done to produce to me, notary, to be done to this act, a duly certified copy of the resolution of the stockholders of said company, heretofore referred to.
Thus done and signed, in my office in the city of New Orleans on the 12th day of the month of June 1921, in the presence of Albert L. Vitter and Charles I. Denechaud, competent witnesses, who have signed these presents, together with me, notary, after reading of the whole.
