CANAL-COMMERCIAL BANK TO ERECT UPTOWN MAGAZINE STREET BRANCH.

The Canal-Commercial Trust and Savings Bank will at once erect another of its attractive branches having approved plans for a one-story Italian Renaissance building at 3415 Magazine street, corner of Octavia in the square bounded by Peters avenue.

The section is one of the old retail centers, and the great financial institution decided upon the location three years ago. A branch was opened in a structure acquired there, and M. M. Baker was placed in charge.

The exterior will have a granite base. The walls will be of iron spot brick, with white joints. Trim, cornice, and entrance will be formed of Bedford limestones.

The lobby will be subdivided with bronze, marble, and glass screens. The officers' division will have a low rail, and will be situated at the Magazine and Octavia corner, to the left of the entrance lobby.

There will be large vaults for specie deposits, also safety deposit vaults and boxes, the latter reached through a private lobby. There will be provided all modern utilities for the clerical force, and ample floor space back of the screen and cages for the business expansion expected.

The erection of such elaborate branches is typical of the new times of financial foresight and permanent construction.


E. A. ZATARAIN MAY LAND CONVENTION.
