PUBLIC MARKETS CLOSED SUNDAYS PLAN OF MURPHY

Butchers in New Orleans markets, which include public, private and quasi-public markets, saw the beginning of the end of Sunday business Tuesday morning when an ordinance was introduced in the Commission Council making it compulsory for the closing of all markets between the hours of midnight Saturday and 1 a. m. Monday.

Mr. Murphy, in introducing the ordinance, stated he did so at the request of a committee of butchers who informed him they represented the Butchers' Union.

The ordinance will probably come up for adoption or rejection at the next meeting of the council next week. If it is voted on favorably by the commissioners, New Orleans housewives must do all of their purchasing of meats, game, fish and other commodities for the Sunday table before midnight Saturday.

Auditor Found Guilty On Charges Of Girl

Emory is auditor for the New Orleans and Lower Coast Railroad. His attorneys, Chandler Luzenberg and David Henriques Friday said they would ask a new trial. Ulic Burke and Richard B. Otero were attorneys for the plaintiff.

NAVAL STATION WHARF TO SERVE LUMBER TRADE.

Proper Facilities and Lower Port Charges to Be Offered Important Industry.

The acquisition of the 2500-foot dock of the Algiers Naval Station as a loading and receiving center and the reduction by at least half of the port charges on the commodity are the plans by which New Orleans will seek to come into its own as the chief lumber exporting point on the Gulf.

Mobile, Gulfport and Beaumont, where the port charges are nominal, now far outstrip New Orleans in this important trade, and the only reasons, according to a report made by T. D. Sadler, traffic manager of the Dock Board, to the advisory committee on docks Wednesday night, are that the charge here is \$1.50 per 100 feet and no facilities have ever been provided to encourage the movement of lumber.

The government, General Manager Walsh said he understands, is to close the Algiers station entirely and has no further use for the wharf. If it can be obtained by the Dock Board it will serve admirably for the lumber industry, and will so co-ordinate and systematize handling that the charges could be reduced fifty per cent.

The lumber men, it was stated, favor New Orleans because the large number of ships calling here afford opportunities for part cargo shipments and all would make this their main exporting point, if only a reasonable port charge is made and suitable wharf space is provided.
