Holmes Store Rounds Out 80 Years' Service

Sunday was the eightieth anniversary of the founding of D. H. Holmes Company's Store.

It was in 1842 that Mr. Holmes moved to Chartres street, then near the center of New Orleans' gay social life.

Four years afterwards he took the daring step of moving to Canal street, occupying the present store site little more than the space now taken up by the present store's show windows.

During the years which followed D. H. Holmes gradually purchased neighboring real estate, and finally the entire space from Canal street to Iberville Street.

The city directory of 1838 records D. H. Holmes in business in Magazine street.

In the first Holmes store, there was a floor space of 100 square feet. Today 225,000 square feet are covered by the various departments of the big establishment.

Some of the more recent steps in the development of the store have been: 1911, Dauphine street entrance built; 1913, Canal street front rebuilt and enlarged; 1916, rotunda filled in, adding 25,000 square feet of floor Iberville street built. The latter building houses the delivery system, ice cream plant, bakery, laundry, cold storage plant and heating apparatus, space; 1919, five-story warehouse in and made room for the new restaurant which now is a thriving department.

Up to 1885 the store was a one-man organization. Mr. Holmes in that year associated with him as partners Samuel Geoghegan and Samuel Waller, the latter in charge of the New York buying office. Upon the death of Mr. Holmes in 1898 Mr. Geoghegan took charge. When in 1902, he went to Ireland, the management passed to Daniel H. Holmes, Jr., and Dr. C. H. Thomas, son-in-law of the founder.

D. H. Holmes Company, Limited formed in 1905, with D. H. Holmes, Jr., as president. Mr. Geoghegan was recalled from Ireland as vice-president and manager. The other directors were John J. Gannon, treasurer; Bernard McCloskey, Robert W. Wilmot, William P. Brown, Hugh McCloskey, Gustaf R. Westfeldt, Emanuel Steinhart Oscar L. Putnam and Frank B. Hayne.

On Mr. Geoghegan's death in 1906, he was replaced by W. J. Gilbert as manager, and Mr. Gilbert, who died in 1911, by Fred W. Evans. Mr. Evans is manager and president.
