FOR NATIONAL BEAUTY HONORS

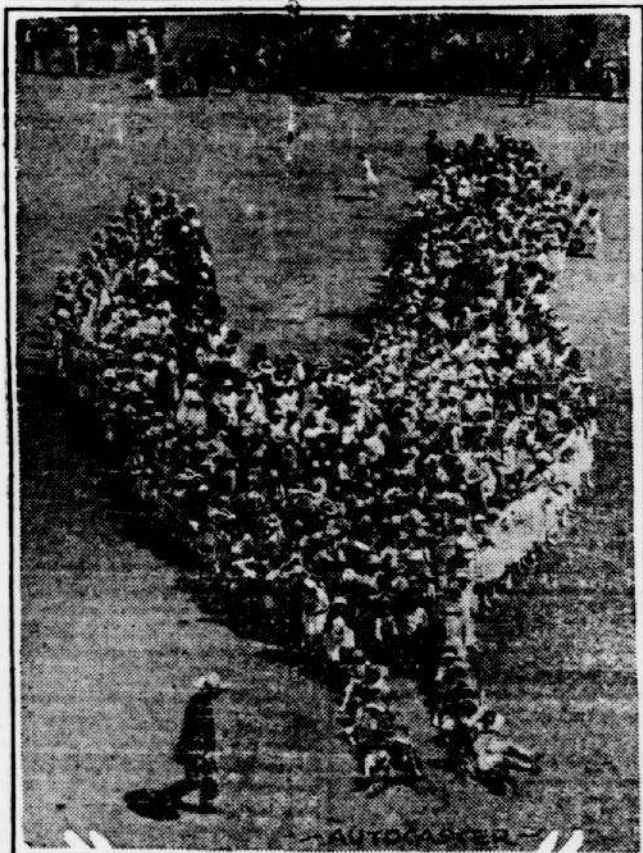
