Richard Lloyd Jones tells How to Get Our Problems Solved

WE have heard much through the last two years about the farm bloc. When this movement began most people looked upon it as a political curiosity. But it drew to its support so many conscientious and earnest men that the nation began to realize that there was something elemental in the idea that must demand serious national consideration.

The Non-Partisan League was a forerunner of this protest. It advocated a right program for its members. But it could prosper only in a state like North Dakota where the larger majority of the people are engaged in just one business—grain growing. It could not spread. We can't have a government of grain-growers. Any one vocation government is oligarchy. There is where this right protest took on impossible political form.

The Populist party back in the 80's and early 90's that flowered in Kansas was the beginning of the present farm bloc movement.

Cities live on the soil. The big city lives on the little city, and the little city lives upon the farm. Science has come along with the automobile, the telephone and a hundred things that multiply efficiency, speed up industry with economy but always with the economy that costs. We have been learning how to live better. The lesson has gone out to the open acres. Fifty years ago few farm boys had ever tasted ice cream. The soda fountain today is a village need, and the movie a community demand. Minnesota eats Florida fruit. There are a thousand legal, economic, marketing, industrial problems today where fifty years ago there was one. In consequence the cost of administering all government, township, town, county, state and nation, has mounted with the multiplication of the problems that grew out of our ever increasingly intricate life. All these make taxes.

In a normal farming community in Nebraska the tax rate on tilled land has gone from \$93 to \$494 in just six years. The farmer says he can't stand the gaff. The tax cost is exceeding the profit on production.

The same complaint comes from the city banker and manufacturer. The farmer has no monopoly on tax payments. Did you ever hear of a popular tax? It doesn't cost anything to live in a wilderness. We want all things that progress has brought us. We don't want to part with the soda fountain or the telephone. We can't give up the auto or the university extension. Very well then, what are we going to do?

New England had a great idea in the town meeting. Philadelphia with her nearly two millions of people, is now talking the town meeting idea. Out in the corn belt of the middle west the town meeting is again taking hold. And when, in a town of only 300 people surprise was expressed because over 200 were in attendance, the answer came, "We have to go to the town meeting. It's the only way we can ever solve our problem."

That's the only way we ever can.

Public ownership of public utilities and a scientific marketing system of the products of the land will both save us and ever going to get there is to get together, talk it over and then do it. Find out what we can do, what we want to do, and then send to our state legislatures and to our Congress not a lot of half-baked country lawyers but practical producers—men who know what we want done and who will do it.

 Last Sunday was a day that will be an out-standing one in the memory of our people. The Bishops of our Church had been holding their fall meeting in the city and on Sunday they were assigned to the various pulpits. By request of the pastor, Bishop John M. Moore came to us and there has never been a more appreciative nor a more appropriate message than he brought to us. He has been interested in our affairs for a long time. He took occasion to refer to the fact that when he was Secretary of the Home Board of Missions he had been all over Algiers and examined the locations that were contemplated and had rejoiced in our success. He further said that we had said all we needed in order that we might do a great work was a building and that now we had the building that we would surely redeem our promise. He then gave us a great message from the subject "Man shall not live by bread alone." Matt. 4:4. His message was largely to the young people, and as usual in our congregation they were largely in the majority of attendants. He urged not for that which was good but for that which was best as our life's goal. The highest should be aimed for and not just the ordinary. It was an inspirational hour and the good Bishop may be sure that the seed fell upon good ground and will yield a harvest for the Master's kingdom. The Men's Choir gave their usual good music of special anthems and also a solo by Mr. Leonard Nash. At night, the pastor spoke to a Church only about half filled as he urged the members to go across the river to First Church and hear Bishop Beauchamp speak. Quite a number accepted the invitation and did so. The Mizpah Choir nearly all attended, but Miss Hafkesbrung was at the organ. Last Wednesday, December 6, 1922, occurred the death of Mrs. T. A. Pollock, Sr., at the home of her son, Dr. J. E. Pollock, 627 Oliver. Her death was unexpected, as she was in good health. Her dear husband had been taken from her only two weeks previous to the date of her own death, and she had apparently taken up the thread of her life again, when she too was called. She and Mr. Pollock had been married for fifty-seven years and had lived in our community for about twenty-nine years. She had been a member of our local church since March 17, 1895, when she joined by letter, while Dr. J. B. Walker was pastor. It is stating the real truth when it is said that there has not been a better loved member of our church than she was. Her remains were buried from the little church that she loved so well, and that she served so faithfully all of these active years, at four o'clock December 7. The choir rendered appropriate music and the pastor made a short talk in which he spoke of her virtues, and of how tenderly she had been loved by the membership of the church, and by the people of the whole community. Dr. Rightor of Mt. Olivet Episcopal Church assisted the pastor in conducting the services. She left five children as follows: Mrs. J. D. Killian, Summit, Mississippi; Mrs. A. B. Smith, Indianola, Mississippi; Mr. T. A. and Miss Evelyn, and Dr. J. E. Pollock, all of our city. These may fully appreciate the fact that they had such good parents. They will never have to apologize for any act of their parents, and may well be proud of the good name that is left them to revere and appreciate. These good people will be greatly missed by their friends and loved ones, but we must appreciate the fact that they finished the race of life, and had laid down the working tools of life, when the day was about over. Neither of them had a suffering illness nor a painful death. We pray God to bless and comfort those who mourn these dear parents who have been taken in such a short time from them.
