

MANY CHANGES FOR THE POLICE

Shows Several Changes For A Better And More Efficient Service.

NIGHT OFFICERS ON DUTY

Chief of Police Cassidy has made several changes and transfers in the department, which are now in effect.

Among the changes it will be noted that a night policeman will be on duty at the City Hall from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. Several other important changes have been made and are as follows:

Officer T. A. MaGee is transferred from the night force to the day force, and his beat shall be in North Bogalusa, and his hours shall be from 7 a. m. until such time at night as his presence is no longer required.

Officer J. P. Burns is transferred from the day force to the night force, to accompany officer W. A. Pierce. Their hours shall be from 6 p. m. to 6 a. m. and their beat shall extend all along Columbia street, the Company Quarters and Richardsontown.

Officer Stratman is to remain on the day force, and his hours shall be from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m., and his beat shall be the same as that covered by Burns and Pierce.

Officer Williams is transferred from Columbia street to be night man at City Hall. He will receive frequent reports from the night men on duty, and he shall respond to any urgent call in North Bogalusa.

Officer Morgan Bankston is appointed jail watchman, and his hours shall be from 6 a. m. to 6 p. m. and he shall respond to any call in the immediate vicinity of the jail.

All policemen, when not on duty are subject to emergency calls to any part of the city.

A number of telephones will be installed in different parts of the city, and it will be the duty of all policemen, while on beat to report hourly to the City Hall.

A contract has already been let to construct a frame building at a cost of \$1235.00 and it was the intention to later use this building as a storage house and stable for the City. At the meeting Tuesday it was decided that it would be best to await the time when a brick or concrete structure could be erected. Several other matters of minor importance came before the session.

IMPORTANT CHANGES ON N. O. G. N. NEXT MONDAY

Granted Authority To remove Four Trains

The State railroad commission has granted the N O G N authority to discontinue effective Jan. 3 train No 33 which leaves Tylertown at 4.44 am, arriving at Bogalusa at 6.45 am. also train known No. 34 which leaves Bogalusa at 6.20 pm, arriving at Tylertown at 8.36 pm. The Commission also granted authority to discontinue train No. 22 which leaves North Slidell at 8.20 am arriving at Folsom at 10.25 am and No 21 which leaves Folsom at 2.20 pm arriving at North Slidell at 4.17 pm. The removal of these trains still gives the towns along the line one passenger train each way each day
