### Mr. Lindsley Before Police Jury To Talk Finance

The Police Jury of Washington Parish met at Franklinton on Tuesday. Finances, as usual was the principal theme of discussion. Messrs Sanford and Keaton were appointed by President Smith as a Committee of two to confer with the Washington Bank and Trust Co., Fiscal Agents, for the purpose of finding some way out of their pecuniary difficulties.

In the afternoon, the task of selecting an incumbent for the new position of Road Supervisor was tackled. After three hours of balloting and discussion, Mr. H. E. Willis of Bogalusa was chosen. Mr. Dyson Booty of Franklinton was the nearest competitor, receiving a tie vote with Mr. Willis for four successive ballots.

Mr. Willis has been a resident of Bogalusa for over five years during which time he has been employed by the Great Southern Lumber Co. where he had charge of most of the street and construction work. Mr. Willis is well fitted for the work.

## COMMISSION COUNCIL HELD BUSY SESSION

### Several Ordinances Passed And Claims Allowed

At a regular meeting of the Commission Council on Tuesday afternoon with all members present, several important matters were disposed of. An ordinance regarding the loitering of boys under 18 years of age in pool rooms was passed. This ordinance was favored by both parents and pool room proprietors. Other ordinance of minor importance were also passed.

The ordinance regarding the prohibiting of boxing exhibition in the city on Sundays was discussed but no action was taken. O. J. Sherman and G. G. Timberlake represented the followers of the "manly art" and contended that the ordinance, in their belief, was unjust as Sunday was about the only time when the laboring people could attend a contest.

De Witt Richardson asked the council to take action regarding a ditch which overflows following heavy rains. The matter was referred to the committee in charge of this department. Several claims were allowed, the minutes of the previous meeting, with two slight changes were accepted.

### More Men Placed At work In Railroad Shops This Week

### PAPER MILL TO REOPEN

Conditions in Bogalusa are improving each week and within a course of a very short time there will not be an idle man in Bogalusa unless he does not want to work. Announcement has been made by Mr. Jno. L. Davis, Supt. of Transportation of the N O G N that another force of men were put to work on Monday and he futher states that just as soon as a shipment of supplies are received, that more men will be placed to work in car repairing department. Things at the shop have begin to look like the "good old fashioned days" when everyone was busy. N O G N Officials state orders for cars are increasing and that business is showing a decided improvement.

### Paper Mill To Get Busy.

Col. Wright has returned to Chicago after spending several days in Bogalusa making plans for the reopening of the paper mills. It is announced that within the next three or four weeks that this enterprise will be a busy scene as work will begin on installing the new machinery and just as soon as it is placed a force of not less than 150 men will be given steady employment.

### Lumber Markets Encouraging.

The gradual improvement and demand of lumber is also encouraging and several of the smaller mills have already or are preparing to reopen. With a good demand for lumber, Bogalusa will witness the busiest periods in her history.

### Veneer Plant.

There are no new developments regarding the veneer plant. The committee which was to go to Columbia last week did not make the trip but it is announced that possibly the inspection of the Columbia plant will be made this week.
