Walter Burke, of New Iberia, present state senator.

There may be others—the entry list is not closed—and on the other hand, it is reasonably certain there will be quite a few "scratches" before the barriers are lifted and the race begun. Only the three first named gentlemen have up to the present writing, given anything like positive assurance that they are "in to the finish."
