G. S. L. To Ship Cargo To England This Week On "Drumloist"

PRICES STILL ON ADVANCE

Fifty Carloads Of Potatoes To Be Shipped From Here

As spring progresses the lumber continues to improve. Demands for most all items are good, and prices are on the upward trend. The mills throughout the "Ozone Belt" are well supplied with orders and the general outlook for April is very encouraging. Building operations in the North and East, after the long months of winter idleness, have opened in full swing at last, and are making heavy calls upon the retail lumber yards throughout those sections, whose stocks were already largely depleted. Consequently those dealers are placing orders for yard and shed stock as fast as possible, which of course is causing the prices to advance accordingly. Many of the retail dealers have within the past few weeks visited Bogalusa while on their southern trip, and seem to be placing their orders direct with the manufacturers rather than through the wholesaling concerns.

It seems to be the general conviction in the export trade that the War in Europe will soon come to an end, and for that reason the market in this end of the business is looking up. The Great Southern Lumber Co., will clear a cargo for England this week on the Steamer "Drumloist," which will sail from Gulfport. The Great Southern also reports something doing in the South American trade, they having recently gotten out two cargoes of Rio Deals.

AT TURPENTINE PLANT
The Bogalusa Turpentine Company, of this place, with a camp at Marston, about four miles north of here, has commenced their operating season and, in fact, has already shipped some turpentine and rosin at satisfactory prices. The products of this concern are, of course, made out of what would otherwise be an absolute waste, and are, therefore, what may be called true "conservation."

AT PAPER MILL
Work is progressing satisfactorily on the large paper mill at this point, and everything seems to be getting in readiness for the wheels to start turning on schedule time.

BIG POTATO SHIPMENT
It is reported that about fifty carloads of potatoes will soon be shipped out of Bogalusa by the truck growers. Last year only about a dozen cars went out from this city, which illustrates the increased activity along this line.

give everyone an equal chance, and the prizes will not be given those only showing the "best appearance" but to those showing the greatest civic pride and consequent improved appearance of yards.


