HALF OF DEATHS IN U. S. COULD BE PREVENTED

This Startling Statement Proven At Meeting Rev. Brakefield Attended

Rev. J. E. Brakefield returned last week from Houston, Texas, where he attended the Southern Sociological Congress and reports that he was deeply impressed with the movements that are being placed in operation throughout the country to fight disease in various forms. Among the facts proven and demonstrated at this Congress were that fifty per cent of the deaths in our country are preventable and that ninety per cent communicable diseases should be prevented. "Swat The Fly." "Fight the Mosquito" etc. were discussed showing the good that could be accomplished and the diseases these insects bring. Among the prominent speakers at the meeting were Ex-Gov. Hooper, of Tennessee, Dr. Jno. E. White, of Atlanta, and Bishop Theo. B. Bratton, of Jackson. Rev. Brakefield also attended the Southern Baptist Convention. This Denomination with its nearly 5,000 messengers, from the 3,000,000 members of churches throughout the Southern States, did the largest amount of work in all the departments the past year in their history.

SEASONABLE DISHES.

The use of carrots in the diet should be more common, as the carrot is a valuable vegetable. The elements which it takes from the soil are needed to keep the blood well balanced and in good condition. Carrots With Curried Rice.—Fry one onion in two tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of stock and one teaspoonful of curry powder. Cover the pan and gently simmer for 20 minutes. Then throw a half cupful of rice into a quart of boiling water and cook until tender. Have ready diced, cooked carrots and brown in a little butter. When ready to serve, arrange the carrots on a platter, and place the curried rice around them as a border.

Rose Pudding.—Pour one pint of raspberry juice into a saucepan and add one cupful of sugar. Add a half-cupful of cornstarch, mixed with a little cold water to the boiling fruit juice and then partly cooled, after cooking well, add a teaspoonful of rose water and almond extract, half of each. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Dip a melon mold into cold water, drain and sprinkle with chopped almonds. Fill the mold and sprinkle with the almonds. Serve unmolded with whipped cream heaped around the mold.

Cheese Salad.—Put one tablespoonful of olive oil and the yolk of a hard-cooked egg into a saucepan, beat together with a spoon, add a half teaspoonful of salt and a quarter of a teaspoonful of pepper to these ingredients, and mix well. Grate a pound of cheese and mix that with a teaspoonful of made mustard, add to the first mixture, and then add two tablespoonfuls of vinegar, and serve on lettuce leaves.

French Rice Pudding.—Take a half-cupful of ground rice, add two cupfuls of milk, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, three well-beaten eggs, a quarter of a cupful of raisins and half a teaspoonful of vanilla. Cook the rice and milk together six minutes, cool; add the eggs and other ingredients and pour into the oven to bake slowly for an hour.
