AUTO GOES 90 MILES PER HOUR AND WINS BIG EVENT

Indianapolis, Ind., May 31.—Ralph De Palma won the fifth annual 500 mile international sweepstakes on the Indianapolis motor speedway here today in the remarkable time of five hours thirty-three minutes and 55 1-2 seconds. The victor traveled at an average speed of 89.84 miles an hour and set a new record for the race.

Davio Resta, who finished second, four minutes behind the winner, contested every mile of the way and the battle of these two pilots was the feature of the contest. Gil Anderson was third and completed the race in 5:42:27.57 seconds.

THREE BREAK RECORD

DePalma, Resta and Anderson all broke the record for the race established in 1914 by Rene Thomas, who finished in 6:3:45.9.
