GREEN TELLS GOVERNOR WHY HE ATTACKED FRANK

William Green stabbed Leo M. Frank because he feared the prison would be attacked by a mob bent on lynching Frank.

Green said he alone planned the attack several days before it took place, but said nothing to anyone about it. He said that the knife he used was not the one he used when killing hogs that Saturday as reported, but that he had stolen the weapon from the kitchen Friday before the attack. He hid it in his bunk, he told the governor.

"I felt that as long as he (Frank) was here there was danger of the prison being attacked," Green said. "I was afraid the guards and the people making the attack would shoot at each other and people be killed, so I came to the conclusion that it was my duty to save the people from danger to which Frank's presence exposed them. So I decided to kill him."

Frank's condition is much improved today.
