

## ARE OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED FARMERS TO LOCATE NEAR HERE

Land At Low Prices With Terms And Advances Make It Possible For Most Of Land To Be Sold Soon

Washington Parish is destined to become one of the greatest agricultural and cattle raising communities in the South and the demonstration which was held at the Bogie Chitto farm Saturday proved conclusively that can be accomplished on the land over land within a period of a few months. Those who had not realized this section cannot realize the revelation that has taken place in that vicinity. A tract of 2,600 acres of land that a few months ago appeared like a majority of the overlands has been transformed into one of the finest farms to be found in the state. And crops were raised on this land this season which yielded more than much of the best lands in what is considered the farming communities.

Never were such opportunities offered the farmer of the North, West and South to locate in a section where the future is certain and where values are certainly to increase fast. Never were farmers offered valuable land at such prices as are now being offered; not mentioning the terms on which the land will be sold or the advances made by the Great Southern Lumber Co. For years it has been known that there is not a better cattle raising section in the entire country than in this parish but during the past two years it has also been shown that crops of all kinds can be successfully raised on these lands and a market for everything that farmers desire to raise can be disposed of in Bogalusa.

"We are having inquiries every day about the land" said J. K. Johnson, Mgr., of the cut overland department of the Great Southern and it is going to be a question of a very short time until all the best lands in the Parish will be sold. We do not contemplate raising the prices of the land because we would rather have it settled by good farmers now than hold it and get fancy prices at a latter date."

## COTTON REACHES HIGHEST POINT IN TWO YEARS

### October Delivery Sells For 11 And May For 12 Cts Per Pound

The price of cotton reached the highest level recorded since the outbreak of the European war, when October contracts sold up to 11 cts. on the New Orleans exchange Tuesday morning. The rise represented a gain of nearly \$2 a bale since the close Monday, and an advance of over \$11.50 a bale since the early part of July, when October sold down to \$8.60 here.

In New York Tuesday contracts for October delivery sold above the 11 cent mark, while May 1916 future sold above 12 cents in both American markets.

## MAN WITH SKULL CRUSHED HAS CHANCES OF RECOVERY

Hugh Shoemaker, of Zona, who was brought to the Bogalusa hospital Saturday in a critical condition, has a fair chance of recovery despite the fact that a piece of his skull measuring about 3 1/4 inches long by 1 inch wide was removed. He also sustained severe injuries about the mouth and shoulders, his left shoulder being crushed and the bone broken, while three upper molars were knocked out. The injured man was riding a shot gun carriage when the accident occurred.

A message from his bedside Monday afternoon was to the effect that he was rational and apparently not suffering to any great extent.

## NEW SCHOOL HOUSE BEING ERECTED NEAR BIG FARM

A good example of what can be accomplished in a short while by co-operation was shown Saturday when the residents of a section about seven miles west of here gathered together and started what will be known as the Ravinia School district. One year ago, or a little more, this section was a vast expanse of cut-over land, from which the timber had just been removed. The new settlers immediately set to work, and there are now many excellent farms.

The land on which the school house is being erected, together with the lumber, has been donated by the Great Southern Lumber Company, of this city, whose lands adjoin, and the settlers have already begun the construction of the school house, which will be able to accommodate about fifty pupils.

A formal election was held by those present, and the following were chosen trustees of the new school: S. L. Jenkins, C. H. Weitz and Philip Schwandt.

The parish board of education has already made arrangements for the furnishing of the school house, and the appointment of a teacher for this year, and an appropriation has been made for the maintenance.

## 100,000,000 FEET OF YELLOW PINE IS SOLD

More than 100,000,000 feet of new yellow pine orders were booked last week by the mills of the gulf and southern states who are subscribers of the Southern Pine association, with headquarters in New Orleans. This is according to the order file report issued Tuesday for the week's business ending Sunday morning. The record shows 362,520,000 feet of orders on hand, or approximately 18,222 cars; 100,220,000 board feet of new orders booked and 98,500,000 feet of orders shipped during the week.

Attorney General Pleasant opened his campaign at New Orleans Saturday and the event was attended by politicians from all parts of the state. Mr. Pleasant stated that he was in favor of Parish option on the liquor question, but when an election had come up in his parish he voted against the saloons. Pleasant headquarters were opened at the Cosmopolitan hotel where a force of clerks, press agents and others will look after his interests. Lieut. Gov. Barrett will arrive in New Orleans today when he will launch his campaign. It is stated that Mr. Barrett makes public his platform at the meeting today as will Dr. Clarence Pierson the other announced candidate. It is not believed that any other candidates will enter the race.

## WOMAN WHO KILLED BROTHER IN-LAW HAS BEEN ACQUITTED

Yazoo City, Miss., Sept. 20.—Mrs. Robert Strong, who shot and killed her brother-in-law, Garnet Nolan, Saturday evening, was cleared today following an examination before Justices Roberts and Bell. The hearing was at the scene of the shooting near Sartartia. According to the information brought out at the trial Mrs. Strong was forced to shoot Nolan to save the life of her sick sister, Nolan's wife. Nolan, it was stated, came into the room where his wife was in bed and threatened to kill her. He was intoxicated. Mrs. Strong believing her sister's life was in danger fired at Nolan. Four bullets entered his head and he died instantly. Following the hearing today a verdict for justifiable homicide was returned.

The father of the slain man appealed to the court that no action be taken against Mrs. Strong and public sentiment is strongly in her favor.

### A. E. Hudson Dead.

A. E. Hudson, chief car inspector of the G. S. L. Co., on the north side, died at the hospital yesterday afternoon. Few of his friends knew that he was sick and the announcement of his death came as a great shock to them. Death was due to typhoid fever.

The deceased resided on Ave. B, and was a well known and popular citizen. He is survived by a widow and one child. The remains were sent to his old home in Mississippi where the burial will be held.

### Bloodhound Catches Negro

Jno. Bean, colored, who was wanted on the charge of assault and battery upon another negro when he struck him across the head with an iron rod, was captured early yesterday morning by Officer Flournev and his bloodhound. The dog took the trail in the Poplar quarters and followed it to Bogalusa Terrace where the negro was caught. The bloodhound was raised and trained by Mr. Flournev and will be used in running down violators of the law. The dog while young is said to be an unusually good one.
