

## MRS. F. H. GOODYEAR DIES SUDDENLY WHEN BOARDING TRAIN

Was Widow of the Founder of Bogalusa, and Many Comforts of City Due to Her Suggestions.

The saddest news that has come to the citizens of Bogalusa in a long time was on receiving a telegram from Buffalo Monday announcing that Mrs. F. H. Goodyear, the widow of the founder of Bogalusa, had suddenly died.

Mrs. Goodyear was closely identified with her husband when the plans of Bogalusa were being worked out, and many of the comforts of this city are due to the suggestions of Mrs. Goodyear. She also took an active part in improving the conditions of living in Bogalusa and the many things that were suggested and accomplished by Mrs. Goodyear were never made public.

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Goodyear was the holder of the largest stock interest in our community; but this she considered not of so much consequence as the interest she felt in the citizens of Bogalusa who were assisting in the building of the city and the carrying out of the splendid ideas of her husband. Mrs. Goodyear was a highly educated woman and of very great natural, practical ability, and we all shall miss her wise counsel. We are expressing the sympathy of the entire population of the city of Bogalusa when we express to Frank H. Goodyear our feeling at this time. He has lost a splendid mother and Bogalusa has lost a close friend.

## WRECK ON NORTHEASTERN DELAYS N. O. G. N. TRAINS

Bogalusa people who went to New Orleans Saturday were considerably delayed and inconvenienced by a wreck of Northwestern train No. 3, which occurred at 9:15 Friday night when the engine, mail and baggage cars were derailed and rolled down the embankment. Ten persons were slightly injured, but the wreck is considered a lucky one, as the train carried several passenger coaches which were crowded. Railroad officials state that they are confident that the train was wrecked by a party who had intended looting the wreckage. The train was running at a rate of 30 miles an hour when the accident occurred. The wreck was only a short distance from North Shore and the wreckage was cleared and the track opened Monday afternoon.

### Kills Monster Snake

H. L. McClendon, residing a few miles from Bogalusa, was in town last Thursday with a snake which he killed the day before. It was a rattler and measured 6th in length after its head and rattler had been taken off. The snake was found while he was hunting and he emptied the contents of a shot gun into the reptile. Mr. McClendon stated that before he removed the head it measured 7 ft. This is the largest snake reported to have been found in the parish for several years.

## FAIR THIS YEAR A PRONOUNCED SUCCESS

#### Attendance on Friday Was Great—Gov. Hall Made Address

All records for attendance and exhibits were smashed at the fourth Washington Parish Fair, which was brought to a close Saturday. The success of the fair this year means that these fairs are to be permanent and to grow in interest each year.

Friday was the banner day and over 500 Bogalusa people attended the fair on this day. Gov. Hall, Mavor Sullivan, U. S. Senator Randsell and Ex-Gov. J. Y. Sanders made addresses on this date. A special train was run from Bogalusa and all parts of the Parish had large representations on that day.

Live stock exhibits surpassed the fondest expectations of even the directors and no little praise is due the Diamond L Ranch and the Bogue Chitto Stock Farm of their co-operation. The Diamond L Ranch sent ten thoroughbred Herfords. A fine lot of Herfords were shown by the Bogue Chitto Stock Farm Co. as well as several fine Angora goats. The fine Percheron stallion, said to be a perfectly shaped animal, attracted much attention. This stallion is 15 1-2 hands high weight 1089 lbs. The grandfather of this horse was "Taxpayer" who was sold for \$3,600 at a public outcry.

Anything you desired to see in hogs was on exhibition, from the Arkansas Razorbacks to Berkshires and Poland Chinas. The poultry exhibit was good, though not large.

The silo in operation was an interesting sight to those who had not visited the one at Isabel, The Great Southern Lumber Co. of this city, erected the silo at their own expense and maintained it during the fair.

The new Agricultural building was one of the most attractive places, and one entire wing was devoted to the display of the Bogalusa Schools. This one display was well worth the trip to Franklinton, and some idea of the remarkable progress being in Bogalusa schools was shown by this exhibit.

There were exhibits of fancy work, cooking, preserving and in fact nothing was overlooked to have exhibits that would appeal to all.

The State Board of Health was represented by Dr. Dowling who gave demonstrations and suggestions for better babies and sanitation.

The directors are to be congratulated for making the fair this year the success they did and it will be a standard to go by for many years to come.

### E. E. Canada Dead.

E. E. Canada, a merchant of Richlandtown died Friday. Death was due to Brights disease. He has been a resident of Bogalusa for a number of years and was well and favorably known. He is survived by a widow and several children. Mr. Canada was 59 years of age, and the first to die of a family of eleven children.

## BOGALUSA LOST FIRST GAME OF THE SEASON

#### However The Visitors Were Given A Hard Battle

In one of the best games ever played on the local gridiron, the Boys' High School, of New Orleans, football team defeated the Bogalusa High eleven Saturday by a score of 12 to 6.

Both sides made a touch-down in the first quarter, but after this they settled down to playing the game, and it was not until the first part of the last quarter that another point was made by either side, when Boys' High crossed the Bogalusa line for a touch-down, which proved to be the visitors' winning point, as it placed the score 12 to 6. Although Captain Underwood of the local team made a long end run from the 30 yard line to within 5 yards of the visitors' line, causing the heavy betters to feel at ease for the time being, and making Underwood the hero of the occasion but all was lost as the final whistle was blown at this time, leaving the New Orleans boys as the victors.

The following are the important plays as they were made:

#### First Quarter.

Gilmore received kick off and gained the 40 yard line.

Underwood makes touchdown on fourth down, after receiving Richardson's bad pass from center, but failed to kick goal.

Boys High kicked ball; Gilmore falling on ball at 10 yard line.

Underwood kicks on fourth down; High School caught ball on 40 yard line and gained 20 yards.

High School makes long end run for touchdown, but fails to kick goal.

High School kicks off, Spring receives ball on 20 yard line and gains 20 yds.

#### Second Quarter.

High School takes ball on 40 yard line.

Bogalusa was here penalized for being off-side.

The High School follows her lead and takes two ten yard penalties for the same offence.

Underwood intercepts forward pass at 40 yard line.

High School penalized ten yards and are followed by Bogalusa obtaining a 20 yard penalty for the same offence—true to the Bogalusa spirit; they can't be outdone.

#### Third Quarter.

Bogalusa kicks off and High School receives on 30 yard line, gaining but 6 yards.

High School kicks on fourth down. Gilmore receives and gains ten yards.

Ramey kicks ball on fourth down and Starns tackles New Orleans.

High School kicks on fourth down, ball blocked by Jenkins.

#### Fourth Quarter.

High School's ball on fifteen yard line, ball fumbled, Starns falls on it at fifteen yard line, after which New Orleans is penalized ten yards.

High School makes touchdown on third down.

Underwood makes long end run from the 30 yard line to within 5 yards of the line.

The visitors played a snappy game from start to finish and did excellent team work while about half of Bogalusa's men played together, the other half, being new men, became nervous at times and tried to play against the whole team at once. This seemed to be especially the case with J. Richardson at center; it being the first match game he was ever in. He became excited and threw the ball wild a number of times, which had a lot to do with Bogalusa's defeat. Nevertheless, Coach Moore expects to put him under his special care with a number of the other members of the team, and another defeat like Saturday's is not expected this season.
