

## MAN TRIES TO CRUCIFY SELF IN FRISCO CHURCH

### Drives Four-inch Spikes Through Both of His Feet

San Francisco, Nov. 8.—Attempted self crucifixion, a stranger who gave his name as Thomas D. Thornton caused great confusion among the worshippers at St. Mary's cathedral here Sunday, when, with a length of gas pipe he drove a four inch spike through each instep and nailed one of his feet to the floor.

He uttered no cry of pain and was restrained by ushers who were summoned by those near him.

The action took place while the most sacred part of the Roman Catholic mass was in progress. The fact that the congregation was kneeling gave the man the opportunity to remove his shoes unnoticed and drive the nails before being interfered with. It was necessary to use a hammer to pry the spikes loose. He was removed to a hospital where he will be examined as to his sanity.

## ANOTHER FACTORY FIRE CLAIMS MANY VICTIMS

New York, Nov. 6.—Thirteen persons are known to be dead, twelve others, who are missing, eight of whom are girls may have perished, and forty-one were injured in a fire that swept through an old factory building at 281 North Sixth street, Brooklyn, this afternoon.

The victims were young factory girls and a few men. They were either baked to death while clinging to the fire escape, or their brains were dashed out in despairing leaps to the brick streets from the fourth and fifth stories.

Growing tired of being the bottom dog Bogalusa High School eleven defeated the fast Manual Training School eleven by the score of 20 to 13, on the local gridiron Saturday. The game was interesting from the beginning to the end and at one time only did it give any sign of being slow. This was in the 3rd quarter when Bogalusa showed a loss of the fighting spirit, probably caused by them having thirteen points to their credit already and allowed the visitors to cross their goal line twice, but they only kicked one goal, placing the score 13 to 13. After this the High School team regained the old pen, and went to work, driving the opposing team before them until they were within twenty yards of the goal. Yeager then forward pass to Starns; Skinney made a sensational catch and went over the line for a touch down. Bogalusa then kicked goal, the score 20 to 13.

## FLORIDA FORBIDS SALE OF LIQUOR 6 P. M. TO 7 A. M.

Tallahassee, Fla., Nov. 5.—The state supreme court here yesterday upheld provisions of the recently enacted state liquor law which prohibit sale of liquor between 6 p. m. and 7 a. m. and forbid its sale in less than half pint quantities. The vote to uphold the provisions was three to two.

Everyone who came in contact with them were proud to claim them as citizens of Washington Parish. He came here from Chicago where he was a member of the Masonic lodge as well as the Consistory and the Shrine of that city. Improvements on the farm occupied most of his time but nevertheless his acquaintance was large.

The remains were shipped to Chicago Tuesday afternoon accompanied by his widow and his two children.

## PELLAGRA SQUAD REPORTED AS IMPROVING RAPIDLY

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 7.—Only one of the eleven men who composed the "pellagra squad" remained on the convict farm after being pardoned by Gov. Brewer, though six of them had the disease and two others were under suspicion. The one man remaining, and who is there vet, is Alex Gamble, from Jefferson county, one of those who developed pellagra. During the past week he has gotten well along on the road to recovery, having gained five pounds in weight, but says that he will stay that he will stay where he is until he is cured and satisfied of cure and regains his strength.

## WILSON'S POLICY ATTACK ON CHRISTIANITY SAYS BRYAN

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—Former Secretary Bryan came out squarely against President Wilson's national defense plan today in a formal statement in which he took issue with the President's views as expressed last night before the Manhattan Club in New York.

"A departure from our traditions; a reversal of our national policy, a menace to our peace and safety and a challenge to the spirit to Christianity, which teaches us to influence others by example rather by exciting fear," is Mr. Bryan's view of the national defense plans.

The former secretary of state's statement, which reiterates views he has previously expressed on the subject of preparedness for war, was regarded as the opening gun in the fight which administration leaders expect in Congress against adoption of the plan.

## BOOKKEEPER KILLS OWNER OF MILL NEAR AMITE, LA.

Amite, La., Nov. 8.—John N. Camp, proprietor of the Doyle Lumber company, located at Shiloh three miles south of Amite, was shot and instantly killed by Luther Graves, his book-keeper, in the office of the company, at 10:30 this morning, officers here declared. None of the details connected with the killing could be obtained but it is said that Graves acted in self-defense. Coroner Smith left for the scene of the killing shortly after the news reached Amite.

Graves, it is said, has surrendered to Sheriff Ballard.

## INVESTIGATION ORDERED IN PRISON WHIPPING

### Horrible Practice Exists At Angola Farm Admitted In Part

The horrible practice of whipping prisoners in the state penitentiary was the subject discussed for an hour or more at a meeting of the Prison Reform Association in New Orleans Saturday afternoon, and the feature of the session was a paper by F. S. Shields, the president, a report received by Mr. Shields from various prisons in the country, all of which declared that beating was not necessary to maintain discipline among inmates of reformatories.

President Shields contended in his paper that the statements recently made by a prisoner discharged from Angola farm, which were admitted, in part, by members of the board of control of the penitentiary, brought to light a condition at the penal farm demanding a thorough investigation.

Prison reform advocates insist that the government, whether through state or prison officials, has no moral or legal right to so handle prisoners as to jeopardize their physical health and lower their moral tone.

Mr. Shields pointed out that the association had been chiefly instrumental in abolishing the brutal lease system, and the association owed it to its traditions as well as to the people of the state to see that that the management of prisoners is humane and of a character that would insure, if possible, the physical as well as the moral upbuilding of the prisoners.

## PATIENT JUMPS FROM BALCONY TO PAVEMENT

Evading a nurse in charge of the charity ward on the third floor of the Hotel Dieu, where he was confined, Floriah Villavase, 60 years old, arose from his cot at 11:30 o'clock Monday morning and, going to a balcony adjoining, threw himself over the railing.

He was picked up dead upon the pavement, 35 feet below. His skull had been crushed and death, surgeons said, had been instantaneous. The body was turned over to a sister with whom he had lived at 1351 Columbus street.

Mr. Villavase was a cashier by occupation, but had been out of employment for some time. He was admitted to the hospital August 31. Worrying over his illness, according to the police, was responsible for his suicide.—N O Item

James Jones, a negro sawmill laborer, was injured by a slab falling on his head, and later died in the Insurance Hospital in New Orleans from the effects of the accident.
