**YOUTH WHO KILLED
FATHER MUST HANG**
Speedy Verdict Rendered
In the Sensational New
Orleans Case

New Orleans, La., January 22.—After being out only thirty-five minutes, the jury trying Herman Paillet, aged 24, for the murder of his father in the latter's dairy, June 29, last, returned a verdict of "guilty as charged" which means that Paillet will be hanged.

When E. C. Palmer, foreman, notified Judge Chretien at 5:05 o'clock Friday afternoon that a verdict had been reached, Paillet was led into the court-room. Clerk Patrick read the verdict and Paillet showed no outward signs of feeling. He stood erect while the jury was polled at the request of Attorney Marr. Then he turned and walked in a regular step out of the court-room. As he passed out, he said loud enough for a deputy sheriff to hear: "Well she got what she wanted."

His remaak was believed to have referred to his mother who testified against him. Paillet, although he referred to her as "my dear mother" while he was on the stand Friday, he seemed particularly bitter while she was testifying the preceding day.

When Paillet had reached his cell in the parish prison fifteen minutes after the verdict, he had already removed his coat and shirt and was preparing to drink coffee.

"Have you anything to say regarding the verdict?" he was asked. "I am sorry I cannot thank the jury for fulfilling my mother's wish; but God bless my mother anyhow," Paillet replied. More than this he refused to say.
