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COMPLIMENT TO SANDERS

The returns of the election, wherein Col. Ruffin Pleasant was overwhelmingly selected as the standard bearer for the Democracy of the state, was indeed a compliment to our fellow citizen, Ex-Gov. J. Y. Sanders. Mr. Sanders was the first big man in the State of Louisiana to announce for Mr. Pleasant, and no one in the state took more interest in behalf of Mr. Pleasant's campaign than Ex-Gov. Sanders. Early in the campaign the New Orleans papers used the fact as arguments against Mr. Pleasant and especially did the New Orleans Item take a delight in trying to renew the friction between Mr. Sanders and the New Orleans ring. The New Orleans ring was glad to rally to the support of Mr. Pleasant and Ex-Gov. Sanders because they realized that Pleasant was a sure winner. The results of the election proves, as the Enterprise has said before, that Ex-Governor Sanders is politically the biggest man in the State of Louisiana today.

The election Tuesday convinced many that Bogalusa will have to have another voting place or more booths in the present voting places. There was not a minute from the time the polls opened until they closed that there were not several people waiting in line. The length of the tickets, and having two to vote, was no doubt the cause of much delay. Had the city not been given another voting place recently it would have been impossible for more than 75 per cent to have voted. Arrangements should be made to give Bogalusa another precinct at an early date.

The candidates for the Parish offices are to be congratulated on the manner in which they conducted their campaign. It would have been impossible to have had a more friendly canvass. In several races it was hard to select between the candidates. In the second primary it will be easier for the voters to decide and we hope that the second primary will be as clean and friendly as the first.

Our old aged friend the Times-Picayune has taken another "flop." Now they are for Parker. First thing they know they will be wanting the office of Governor appointive and to be selected by the managers of the Times-Picayune and then they never could agree. And still the Times-Picayune wonders why it is losing its prestige so fast.

Now that the election is over don't forget that the next big event will be at the Y.M.C.A., on Friday evening Feb. 4th., when municipal ownership as well as other important matters will be discussed.

'GARDEN OF ALLAH' IS COMING TO NEW ORLEANS NEXT WEEK

"The Garden of Allah," the success of the New York Century, will be the attraction at the New Orleans Tulane next week commencing Sunday, Jan. 30. The play is a dramatization of Hichens' novel that was one of the "best sellers" a few years ago, and closely follows the novel.

The monk who pines for freedom and human love, who violates his oath and burst his bonds, and why, by so doing brings misery on himself and upon a pure and noble woman, is a figure as old as the monastic idea itself. What is new is Hichens' setting of the subject.

He unrolls the tragedy in the magic atmosphere of the Sahara desert—the great awe-inspiring waste where the spirit of eternity seems to brood; the place which the Arabs have so poetically named "The Garden of Allah." Hichens' book achieved its great success because it is a masterpiece of descriptive writing and of mythical suggestion.


Those responsible for the dramatization of the book have recognized to the full secret of the book's success. They have accordingly taken far more than ordinary pains to reproduce the "atmosphere" of the story. They first made a pilgrimage to the scenes described, and there on the spot they studied and designed the stage appurtenances of the play, and gathered up much of the human and other material. The result is a remarkably faithful portrayal of the spirit of the story, and an extraordinary series of stage presentations.
