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### COUNCIL TAKE STEPS TOWARDS BOND ISSUE

**E. L. Middleton Appointed Commissioner Of Public Affairs**

As was forecasted in last week's Enterprise, E. L. Middleton, a successful Pleasant Hill merchant, was appointed as Commissioner of Public Affairs to succeed W. G. Dorsey resigned, at the session of the council Friday afternoon.

A committee consisting of Commissioners Johnson, Middleton and City Attorney Talley were instructed to make arrangements with some bonding Company to sell the bonds, in case the bond issue is voted and to have all necessary ordinances and resolution ready at the next session of the city council. The rates for electricity and lower water rates were not acted upon but passed over to the meeting next month.

The police were instructed to become better acquainted with the city ordinances and to enforce them. Special instructions were given towards the automobile regulations. The police were ordered to appear in uniform in the future. The throwing of paper and other refuse in the streets and alleys and the blocking of streets and congestion of auto and buggies in certain sections of the city will also receive more attention from the police department.

Dr. Slaughter was elected as City Physician to succeed Dr. H. C. Cole, resigned. Several ordinances were proposed among which is one keep the city streets and gutters clean, another to keep bicycle riders from riding on the sidewalk between the Tate building in N. Bogalusa to the Postoffice. Still another aimed to keep intoxicating liquors from being carried in stock by any store in the corporate limits of the city. Another was proposed making it a penalty for anyone under 18 years to operate a jitney. Other ordinances were proposed.

The First State Bank was selected as the Fiscal agent of the city. They will pay two per cent on average daily deposits when the deposits are in excess to the city's indebtedness and money will be loaned the city by this bank at a rate of 6 per cent. The regular monthly reports were read, a number of claims were ordered paid and other routine business was disposed of.

### FOUND DEAD IN BED WHILE VISITING RELATIVES HERE

Mrs. Josephine Connerly, of Magnolia Miss., who came to Bogalusa about three weeks ago to make a visit with her niece, Mrs. J. N. Ball, was found dead in her bed at 4:30 a. m. last Friday morning. Mrs. Connerly had not complained of being ill on retiring Thursday evening, and during the night she was not known to have been sick. She was 72 years of age and survived by three children, all grown. The remains were carried to Tylertown Sunday where services and burial was conducted. A few weeks ago Mrs. Ball's husband died suddenly and a few weeks previous to that her brother-in-law died.

### Moody Is Improving

T. J. (Till) Moody, the well known and successful farmer, residing about 4 miles from Bogalusa, and who was injured in the shooting affray near his home a week ago last Monday evening, is rapidly recovering from the gunshot in his shoulder. None of the shots pierced his lungs as was first reported, and Mr. Moody's friends wish him a speedy and permanent recovery.

There are no new details in connection with the shooting.
