


Bogalusa's New Y. W. C. A.

SOCIETY FOR PREVENTION OF CRUELTY TO CHILDREN ORGANIZED

Enthusiastic Meeting Which Was Well Attended Held At City Hall Monday Afternoon, Success Assured From Beginning

That Bogalusa usually gets what she goes after was demonstrated at the commission council meeting Monday afternoon, when a record breaking crowd was in attendance to lay lines for starting a Society for the prevention of cruelty to Children. Never was there a project that was accepted with greater enthusiasm than was this one. Miss Lessie Rowan, the probation officer was present and presented many valuable suggestions, as did almost every one present. The society was launched and every one present pledged their faithful support to make it a success from the very beginning. Ways and means were discussed for the raising of funds to carry on this noble work, and it was decided to call a mass meeting in the near future, so as to give every citizen a chance to have a say in the matter. E. L. Middleton was elected president and Mrs. N. S. Young Vice President, the other officers to be elected and appointed later. All work coming under the jurisdiction of the probation officer will be conducted under the auspices of this society after August the first.

MILITIA NOW AT SAN BENITO TEXAS

HANLEY NOMINATED FOR PRESIDENT

Wins Prohibition Nomination For President Over Sulzer.

J. Frank Hanley, formerly governor of Indiana, was nominated for President of the United States, and Ira D. Landreth for Vice-President, last Friday by the Prohibition National Convention which convened at St. Paul last Friday. Mr. Hanley's nomination came on the first ballot, and followed a number of hurried conferences between advocates of the candidacy of William Sulzer, formerly governor of New York, and several brief demonstrations in the latter's behalf. Mr. Hanley received 440 votes as against 181 for Sulzer.

After the nomination of Dr. Landreth the assembly arose and sang the Doxology, and ended a six hour session marking the close of the three day convention.

THE PLATFORM.

The platform expresses opposition to the "wasteful military programs of the Democratic and Republican parties," but favors "preparedness for peace." It suggests a "compact among nations to disarm the navies and disband armies," but until "such court and compact are established we pledge ourselves to maintain an effective army and navy and to provide coast defenses entirely adequate for national protection."

Favors reciprocal trade treaties to be negotiated with all nations and commissions appointed to gather facts.

Favors legislation to encourage the establishment of an adequate fleet of American merchant ships.

Opposes war with Mexico; pledges aid to the protection of American lives, and favors use of force when necessary.

Approves strict interpretation of the Monroe Doctrine; opposes abandonment of the Philippine Islands at this time, but favors ultimate independence.

Favors non-political promotions, to be governed by civil service regulations, applicable to all federal executive officials.

Favors equitable retirement law for maintenance of superannuated federal employees.

UNIFORM DIVORCE LAWS.

Favors uniform marriage and divorce laws and complete suppression of white slavery.

Declares for prohibition of child labor, approves an eight-hour day with one hour's rest each day, and extension of compensation and liability federal acts.

Opposes "pork barrel" legislation and useless federal expenditures.

Favors a single presidential term of six years.

Demands public ownership of utilities, to be operated in the interest of all people.

Believes in equality of all persons.

Favors separation of church and state, with guaranty of full religious and civil rights to all.

Favors public grain elevators, owned and operated by the federal government, and abolition of speculation on markets.

Joe McAvoy, a man well known over the entire state of Louisiana, Mississippi, and a holder of extensive timber lands in this community, dropped dead at Saginaw, Mich. last Monday.
