

Work on New Paper Mill Starts

MATERIAL SHIPPED AND MANY TO BE AT WORK IN FEW DAYS

Plant Will Be Largest of Its Kind In The Country And Will Be Completed In Ten Months Giving Work To Over 400--Mill Will Cost \$1,000,000

A corps of managers, engineers and foremen have arrived in Bogalusa and before the end of the week work will be flying on the new million dollar paper mill which is to be one of the greatest investments in the state of Louisiana this year. It is the intention to start the sewer and trench digging tomorrow, Friday, as G. H. Wood general manager of the Louisiana Fibre Board Co. also manager of the big plant at Monroe, Mich. and who is to manage the Bogalusa plant, believes in starting everything on Friday, and the thirteenth if possible. J. H. Gilmore, who will superintend the construction of the plant estimated that 35 or 40 people would be put to work this week and that in the course of a few days more men would be added and that when work was under good headway that about 200 men would be on the job. With good weather permitting he expects to rush the work and have the plant completed in 10 months. The building will be of brick and it will require two million or more to complete the works.

In the party here are G. H. Wood, "The Paper King," Joseph Skeldon, president of the Skeldon Engineering Company, who will supply a large part of the machinery; James Gilmore, superintendent of construction; L. H. Breyfogle, who will be manager of the mill; P. Delin, who will be superintendent; F. A. Baker, of New York, consulting engineer, and A. J. Lundgren, his assistant, and L. F. Winchell, secretary to Mr. Wood. The party will remain for about ten days and several will remain here permanently.

"Our tools have been shipped and just as soon as they arrive we will begin work in earnest and after that I will let the work speak for itself," said Mr. Gilmore, to a representative of the Enterprise. "I never saw such a magnificent site for a mill as the one you will have in Bogalusa," he continued. He also estimated that the work would be completed in ten months and the cost of erecting the building and buying the machinery is 25 per cent greater than it would have cost to erect the mill a year ago.

L. H. Breyfogle, who is to be the manager of Bogalusa's newest enterprise, states that it will be the largest mill of its kind in the entire country and it will be modern in every respect. "We will work at least 400 men when the mill is in operation," said Mr. Breyfogle. He believes that work on the plant will progress at such a rapid pace that help will be made by the first of July and the finest grade of container shipping board will be produced by August First.

The mill, when in operation, will have a greater capacity than was announced weeks ago. The pulp mill will produce 75 tons, if not more per day and the capacity of the container board will exceed 100 tons a day. The new mill will get its raw material from the Great Southern woods instead of at the mill and there is enough raw material to keep the mill in operation a score of years and more.

The result of work starting on the new mill, as well as the many municipal improvements, connected with the other buildings now in the course of construction and contemplated will give Bogalusa a far

greater building boom than ever before.

Mr. Wood was busy on the plans and details and looking after the starting of the work and getting everything in readiness that he had nothing new to give out. He states that the market is good and that the demand is growing each week and when the new mill is in operation there will be no trouble in disposing of the product. Mr. Wood has visited Bogalusa on a number of occasions and it was due largely to his efforts that the Louisiana Fibre Board Co. of this city has made the great success it has. He is a brother to Major C. R. Wood, General Supt. of the Louisiana Fibre Board Co.

COMMISSIONS TO DECIDE UPON ALL MUNICIPAL IMPROVEMENTS

Each Section of City To Send Representatives To Meeting of Council Monday Afternoon To Name Citizens Wanted On The Committees

YOUNG LADY AND COMPANION SHOT

While Standing On Front Porch At 945 Ave. D Sunday Evening

Miss Tiney Lott, age about 19 is in the Bogalusa Hospital with her face and chest peppered with birdshot. Oliver Arnold is suffering with a wounded arm and Wiley Allen is being held in the Parish Jail at Franklinton charged with shooting the young lady and her companion. The shooting occurred at 945 Ave. D about 8.45 Sunday evening and a short time afterward Allen was arrested. He claims that he is innocent of the crime while the victims state that they are positive that he did the shooting.

Miss Lott is reported to have preferred the company of Oliver Arnold home from church Sunday evening in preference to Allen. They arrived at the Lott home and were standing on the front porch engaging in a conversation when with little warning both barrels of a shotgun were emptied at the young couple. Assistance rushed to the young couple and soon they were under medical attention. A few minutes later the Police were working on the case and Allen was arrested. The police however failed to find the gun alledged to have been used by Allen. They believe that it was hid in the swamps a short distance from the Lott home.

While the condition of Miss Lott is not reported dangerous it is said that she will be marked for life as a result of the shots. Her face was almost covered with gun shot but fortunately none struck her eyes. One tooth was knocked out and several shot took effect in the neck and chest. Number 8 shot was used by the man who fired the shots which is the only reason that the young lady was not killed as the distance from where the shot was fired to where the victims were standing was less than 25 feet.

While the wound of Arnold was very painful it was not considered serious. Allen claimed his innocence but the police state that they will be able to prove he is guilty. Allen was a member of Company "G" and this is the first time that he has been charged with an offense.

TAXES CAN BE PAID NOW AND DELINQUENT DEC. 1

The city and school taxes can be paid within a few days and they will be delinquent after December 1. As a rule the payment of taxes comes the first of August so this year there will be four months of grace without any penalty. The assessment of the city property shows a nice increase over last year.

Sells Furniture Stock

The furniture stock of M. Marx has been sold to Heiman Bros. The stock was sold in order that Mr. Marx could have more room for his building supplies and hardware.

Richardsontown, Columbia Street, Pleasant Hill, South, North and Northwest Bogalusa are urged to send a delegation of residents to the meeting of the Commission Council next Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock when four commissioners will be created which will have much to do towards deciding upon the new schools, new city hall, new fire department and jail, as well as extending the water and sewer system and placing the streets in good condition.

At a special meeting of the Commission council Monday afternoon Mayor Sullivan stated that he thought it would be best to get one or more citizen from each section of the city to act on each commission. He was of the opinion that if live wires were placed on each commission that everything in connection with the improvements would result in Bogalusa getting 100 cents for every dollar expended as well as coming as near possible to pleasing the greatest number of tax payers. The location of the various new improvements, the selecting of architects and all the work connected with various buildings will be decided upon by the various commissions pending the approval of the commission council. "We dont want any figure heads on any of these commissions and we want the livest wires there are in the city" said mayor Sullivan. "We will give each section of the city any opportunity of selecting their own representatives and we hope that each section of the city will send at least five or six well known citizens to the meeting next Monday afternoon and tell us who they want from their section to act. There will be plenty of important work for a few weeks and without any pay but everything this commission accomplishes will be a living monument to the city as well as to the members of the commission."

At the same meeting there were a few changes in the Sewer and Water Board. J. B. Lindsley, H. E. Baumgarten, D. T. Cushing and Jesse Johnson were appointed to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of W. L. Wuescher, W. H. Sullivan, J. Y. Sanders, Jr. and E. L. Middleton who will serve on the commission as a member of Commissioner of Public Utilities.

It is expected that the meeting to select the other four commission next Monday afternoon will be one of the largest attended in the history of the council.

COMMISSIONER WILCOX TENDERS RESIGNATION

Commissioner of Education Wilcox, at the meeting of the Commission Council Monday afternoon, tendered his resignation. The resignation was laid over until the next meeting when it will likely be acted upon. Mr. Wilcox stated that his business required his entire time and that he would like to have the resignation acted upon at the earliest convenience. Mr. Wilcox has served as Commissioner of Education since the city was incorporated and much of the progress of the Bogalusa schools is due to his work.
