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SANDERS SURE TO WIN

RELECTION of Gov. J. Y. Sanders is certain. Not only his friends and supporters concede that he will be re-elected by an immense majority, but those opposing him—and they are few—admit that his opponent made a serious mistake in coming out against so strong a man at this time.

What really surprises us is that Congressman Sanders, whose loyalty and patriotism toward the administration has been so manifestly displayed, should have been put to the trouble of a campaign. While not for once questioning the loyalty of Representative Aswell, Lazaro, Wilson, Dupre, et al, we dare say that the work of Congressman Sanders during his term in congress will compare favorably with the accomplishments of these gentlemen. Why then, should our congressman be forced to enter a campaign at all? Surely, he should have been complimented by no opposition at all, just the same as the unopposed representatives of other Louisiana districts.

There is a strong belief among a great many that a few "chronic kickers" could not stand the idea of Sanders returning to Washington without the knowledge that he had to put up a hard fight to retain his seat. If these opinions are correct, those responsible for such a condition are not as patriotic as they might be.

All this hub-bub about "Sanders is going to be snowed under" and that he is a "political trickster," smacks of enviousness and gives a fellow a bad case of colic. Doubtless, it emanates from some unsuccessful candidate, or some disgruntled fellow, who, in the halcyon days of Governor Sanders held a soft berth under his appointment. It can hardly be disputed that the opposition to him in Tangipahoa parish is confined to that element who were fed right out of his hand. When unable now to ease up against the pie counter and lift another choice cut of pie, they are asking for his retirement. "Smiting the hand that fed them," and lifted them from an obscure position into the reserved arena of political preference.

Chivalrous! Yes, chivalrous!!

If we are not miserably mistaken this scattering opposition will utterly fail in their undertaking. Undoubtedly, they will have to uncover much faster material than is now evident against the old war-horse of Louisiana politics.

Would his retirement be justifiable?

Congressman Sanders has made the district a representative to be proud of. The Vindicator is not alone in this assumption. Two-thirds of the papers in the district—and many outside of the district—declare that he is one of the ablest men sent from this State in many years. He has stood close to the President since entering Congress. He has advocated every measure in support of war policies. He has safeguarded the interests of his constituency.

Then why consider trading him for an inexperienced man?

The sixth district would be taking a hazardous chance to even consider such a proposition.

Had Sanders played the role of Vardaman, then his retirement would have been in order. But he has not differed with the administration on a single war issue and therefore his re-election is due him by the voters of the sixth district. His defeat would mean, in a sense, that the people do not appreciate his stand in the present crisis.

SUNDAY PLEASURE RIDING

THE ORDER ISSUED LAST WEEK to discontinue the driving of automobiles, motorcycles and motor boats on Sunday for pleasure is expected to receive the hearty co-operation of the citizens of Bogalusa and Washington Parish. The order came so late last week that many car owners were not aware of the order. The operation of these pleasure cars on Sunday must be ceased, or it will result in some people not being able to get gasoline during the week. There is a threatened shortage of gasoline, and if auto owners will comply with the request of the fuel administrator there will be enough gasoline to go around. It is a patriotic order and should be complied with. There are certain classes of business which are exempted from the ruling and these are trucks engaged in hauling freight, ambulances, cars of physicians, as well as other business or profession. If you own a car there would be no objection of the authorities for you using your car for a trip which is a necessity where there are no electric or steam propelled means of conveyance. We take it for granted in this city of magnificent distances there would be no objection of you driving your car to church, to the market, or to your office. The order was issued to effect joy riding over the city, to the country, to neighboring towns and any way to save gasoline, so as not to cause a great inconvenience to the public. The rule is to be in force for only 5 more weeks, and certainly every car owner will do all in his power to comply with the request.


