

Z. A. Jones Died Oct. 21 of Pneumonia

Letters expressing regret and describing the funeral of First Class sergeant Andrew Z. Jones, 28, who died at General Headquarters in France on October 21 of lobar pneumonia, have been received by his mother, Mrs. J. M. Fox, 4614 Carondelet street, New Orleans, from Lieutenant Leroy Stevenson and Sergeant E. L. Kincaid, who enlisted with him at Jefferson Barrack in May, 1917. Jones had been in France since August 5, 1917.

Sergeant Jones, who was formerly employed in the treasurer's office of the Great Southern Lumber Company, had received orders to report to Tours, France, on October 19, the day he was taken sick, to receive a commission as a lieutenant. He was a Mason and an Elk. He is survived by his mother, his step-father, J. M. Fox, New Orleans Representative of the American Chiclé Company; two sisters, Miss Ethel Jones and Mrs. H. D. Ferrell, and one brother, Harry Jones, who is in the navy.—Saturday States.

Assessments To Be 100 Per Cent Now

Baton Rouge La., Dec. 21.—Louisiana will, at the beginning of the new year, put in force an entirely new system of assessment and taxation as the result of the ratification of amendments to the State Constitution by the people at the November election. The keystone of the new fiscal system is the requirement that all assessments must be based on a cash valuation of 100 per cent, with a state tax rate of not exceeding 3 mills. Following this are amendments to the Constitution that fix the rate of taxation for the support of the public schools and which limit the parish tax rate to 5 mills for all purposes.

The Board of State Affairs, which is clothed with authority to administer the assessment and taxation laws of the state, is arranging to put the new system into effect, and with that end in view he board is sending out circular letters to police juries and boards of education clearly explaining the operation of the new amendments to the Constitution and the acts of the Legislature.

Vincent Astor to Give 1000 Christmas Dinners

New York, Dec. 21.—Lieutenant Vincent Astor, son of the late Colonel John Jacob Astor, who died on the Titanic, will supply 1000 Christmas baskets to families of the poor on the East Side of New York, it was learned today.

Tickets for the baskets already have been issued to the families by the lieutenant's representatives.

Mississippi Legislature Must Hold Extra Session

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 21.—A brief visit from Governor Theo. G. Bilbo is expected at the state capitol Monday. The governor has been busy on his farm near Poplarville for some time and could not find time to attend the governors' conference now on in Baltimore.

Rumors of a probable extra session of the Legislature in January have not been heard in the past few days, and officials believe that if an extra session is held it will come next fall, although many state institutions will be forced to use 1919 funds for 1918 bills. An extra session will be a necessity sometime between now and the biennial session in 1920, as funds for the operation of state institutions are far too small to carry them through until that time.

Equal Rights Supported by Country's Methodists

Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 21.—It is announced here today that all the annual conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, except three, have voted on the question of laity rights of woman, the result to date showing a total of 4067 votes for the proposition and 417 negative votes. A three-fourths vote, or only 3363 votes, is necessary and laity rights for women in the church is assured.

UNKNOWN PERSONS BLAMED BY JURY

Shubuta, Miss., Dec. 21.—That the four negroes accused of the murder of Dr. E. L. Johnston, their employ-

er, December 10, who were lynched near here Friday night, came to their death at the hands of unknown persons was the verdict of the coroner's jury here today. The negroes, Major and Andrew Clark, brothers, and Mag and Alma House, sisters, all were under twenty years of age.

They were hanged from the girders of the Chickashaw river bridge, two miles from Shubuta, after they had been taken from the Shubuta

jail. Throughout Friday night the bodies swung from the steel span, being left untouched until the coroner arrived today.

Dr. Johnston was killed December 10 while milking a cow in the barnyard near his plantation home.
