### May Register Under Section 5

Z. B. Broussard, our clerk of court and ex-officio registrar, states that those desiring to register under the grandfather clause, Sec. 5 of the general assembly of Louisiana, may do so up to and including the 31st day of August.

Section five in part says: No male person who was on Jan. 1, 1867, or at any date prior thereto, entitled to vote under the constitution or statutes of any state in the United States, where in he then resided, and no son or grandson of any such person, not less than 21 years of age on the first day of May, 1912, and no male person of foreign birth who is naturalized prior to the first day of Jan. 1898, shall be denied the right to register and vote in this state by reason of his failure to possess the educational or property qualifications prescribed by the constitution, provided he shall have resided in this state for five years next preceding the date at which he shall apply for registration and shall have registered in accordance with the terms of this article prior to Sept. 1, 1913 and no person shall be entitled to register under this section after said date.

Every person claiming the benefit of this section, shall make application to the proper registration officer or his deputy for registration.
