**PLAN ABRIGATION OF TREATIES**

A NEW ELEMENT BROUGHT INTO CANAL TOLL CONTROVERSY.  
It is to Exempt Coastwise Ships. Committee Chairman O'Gorman Approves it.

Washington.—A demand for abrogation of the treaties with Great Britain bearing upon isthmian canal rights, presented to the senate Monday in a resolution by Senator Chamberlain, brought a new element into the canal controversy now in progress between this country and Great Britain over the right of the United States to exempt American coastwise shipping from paying tolls. Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the inter-oceanic canal committee, who must handle the resolution, endorsed the Chamberlain resolution. Earlier in the day state department officials had expressed ignorance of Senator Chamberlain's plan to introduce the resolution.

The Chamberlain resolution would require the president to proceed at once to terminate the Hay-Pauncefote treaty of 1901 and the Clayton-Bulwer treaty of 1852. In a statement Senator Chamberlain said the treaties and records would show that the United States never planned to give Great Britain such treaty rights as would justify the protests that country has made.

Senator O'Gorman said: Senator Chamberlain's resolution is a more concrete statement of the position I took in the last session, that if the Hay-Pauncefote treaty justifies Great Britain in making the protest now before our government then it would be well, if means could be found, to abrogate the treaty.

The new angle to the situation caused much discussion in senate circles during the day and brought out many endorsements of the proposal. Senator O'Gorman declared at the close of Monday's session that he believed the resolution would pass by a large majority if it came to a vote.

**Burlison Given Loving Cup.**  
Washington.—San Jacinto Day in Washington was celebrated by Texans Monday with a dual event. The Texas delegation in congress presented Postmaster General Burlison with a loving cup, and the Texas Society had speaking celebrations at the Confederate memorial homes.

The loving cup was a massive silver vessel. It bore the following inscription: "The delegation of the sixty-third congress to Hon. Albert Sidney Burlison, postmaster general, as a token of our esteem and in recognition of his fourteen years of efficient service as a representative in congress, April 21, 1913."

**Balloon Collapses; Five Killed.**  
Naisy le Grand, France.—One of the most terrible accidents to a spherical balloon in many years occurred Thursday. The military balloon Zodiac collapsed at a height of about 650 feet and fell to the ground with its five occupants, all of whom were killed.

The Zodiac, which had a capacity of 1,600 cubic meters, was inflated with ordinary gas and left the Aero Club park at St. Cloud with the military aeronauts, Captains Clavenad and De noue, Lieutenant de Vaissetot and Artilleryman Rechy and the civilian pilot, Aumont Thieville, aboard. Propelled by a strong wind, the balloon passed rapidly over Paris and arrived at Naisy le Grand. All were killed.

**Allies Accept Offer of Mediation.**  
Athens, Greece.—The reply of the Balkan allies was presented to the European powers Monday. It is a general acceptance of the offer of mediation between Turkey and the allies with the reservation, however, that the questions of the disposal of the Aegean islands and of the elimination of the frontiers of Thrace and of the future state of Albania shall be left open for debate between the allies and the powers during negotiations.

**Half Million Belgians on Strike.**  
Brussels.—Upward of 500,000 men are on strike throughout the country, according to the estimates of the socialists. The retail merchants' associations of Belgium, with a membership of 12,000 small traders, have sent an appeal to all the deputies in favor of a solution insuring permanent peace. The savings bank officials report there have been no more withdrawals than usual, which is considered significant.

**Japs Would Fight United States.**  
Tokio.—A demand that the Japanese government resort to arms was hysterically cheered at a mass meeting Thursday to protest against the alien land bill now before the California legislature. Twenty thousand persons assembled and listened to addresses by various orators, who, however, are not affiliated with any organization and younger chauvinists. The speakers also denounced the submissive attitude of the government.

**636 Carloads of Texas Onions.**  
Laredo, Tex.—One hundred and thirty-two carloads of onions were shipped out of Laredo Saturday and Sunday nights, bringing the total shipments to date up to 636 carloads.

**Port Arthur Has \$150,000 Fire.**  
Port Arthur, Tex.—Fire Monday in the barrel houses of the Texas Refining Company, two of which were burned, as well as six tank cars standing near. The loss amounts to about \$150,000.

**New Church for Bedias.**  
Bedias, Tex.—Material has been placed on the ground for the Second Baptist church. The church will be of modern construction and will be quite an addition to the town.

**Double Tragedy at Seadrift.**  
Seadrift, Tex.—The finding of the bodies of C. W. Witzel and wife here Thursday revealed a double tragedy. The couple came here from Electra, Texas.

**THE 9:30 CLOSING BILL VETOED**

BUT GOVERNOR WILL SUBMIT MATTER TO SPECIAL SESSION.  
Says There Are Several Errors in Bill. Also Kills Measure for Incarceration of Habitual Drunkards.

Austin, Tex.—The 9:30 civil closing bill was vetoed Friday by the governor, who gave notice that he would submit the matter of enacting a civil statute to the special session of the legislature in July requiring saloons to remain closed between 9:30 p. m. and 6 a. m. The governor also vetoed the bill providing for the incarceration of habitual drunkards in state insane asylums, the bill establishing a bureau of marketing in the state department of agriculture and the bill creating a special district court in McLennan County.

Inasmuch as the criminal statute requiring the saloons to be closed between 9:30 and 6 o'clock becomes effective July 1, and the special session is to convene July 21, it will not be long before the civil and criminal provisions are made to harmonize.

The governor makes that point in his veto. The issues and errors surrounding the 9:30 closing bill are explained in the governor's veto, which, in part, follow:

"In some way in the passage, engrossment and enrollment of the bill errors crept into the measure. In article 7455, which provides and sets out a blank form of application to be made by a liquor dealer of this state to the controller for a permit and a license to engage in the business of liquor dealer, the applicant of such license is made to swear that he has not sold or authorized any other person to sell, or permitted them to sell liquor at his place of business after 12 o'clock midnight Sunday and between that hour and 6 o'clock a. m. the following Monday of any week since the 1st day of May, A. D. 1909.

"The present statute authorizes liquor dealers to keep their places of business open until 12 o'clock midnight on Saturday and to reopen them at 5 o'clock a. m. Monday and to keep their places of business open until 12 o'clock midnight each day in the week and to open them at 5 o'clock the following morning. It is apparent, therefore, that a liquor dealer could not comply with the requirements set forth in the application. There are clerical errors in other articles of the bill.

"Being earnestly desirous that this act should become a law, I referred the bill to the attorney general, who is a conscientious and painstaking and competent lawyer. He holds, in harmony with the line of court decision and in line, I believe, with the constitution, that the caption of the bill determines its purpose, and says that the bill should be construed with another act passed by the regular session of the thirty-third legislature, which amends article 615, title 11, of chapter 8, of the penal code."

**Embargo on Mexican Freight.**  
Houston, Tex.—An embargo has been placed on all freight traffic from the United States into Mexico via Brownsville and Matamoros. The closing of the Brownsville gateway into Mexico means that the last remaining line has been closed from Texas points to Mexico, El Paso and Laredo having been closed for some time.

**Reserve Agents Approved.**  
Austin, Tex.—The department of banking Thursday approved the following reserve agents: Guaranty State Bank and Trust Company of Dallas, Union National bank of Houston, and Hanover National bank of New York, for the Security State Bank and Trust Company of Longview.

**Proposed \$450,000 Road Bonds.**  
Rosenberg, Tex.—The citizens south of the Brazos river, in Fort Bend County, have petitioned the commissioners court to order an election to determine whether or not they should issue \$450,000 to build good roads. This will mean sixty-five miles of shell or gravel roads in the south portion of the county.

**Levees Break at Memphis.**  
Memphis, Tenn.—Mississippi river levees on both side of the waterways south of Helena, Ark., collapsed Sunday under the pounding of the flood. Neither break, however, will materially affect the situation in the lower valley and the area inundated will be comparatively unimportant.

**Will of Late O. T. Holt is Filed.**  
Houston, Tex.—The will of the late O. T. Holt, formerly mayor of Houston, who died February 6, 1913, was filed for record Wednesday. Mr. Holt left entirely to his widow, Mrs. Miran R. Holt, an estate valued at approximately \$250,000.

**To Expend \$300,000 on Roads.**  
Bay City, Tex.—J. H. Eldridge, government good roads expert, is fitting up offices for himself and assistants preparatory to the supervision of the expenditure of the \$300,000 road bonds just voted.

**\$300,000 Road Bonds at Alvin.**  
Alvin, Tex.—The election held Saturday for the purpose of determining whether or not the district shall issue \$300,000 in good roads bonds carried by a large vote.

**Cannery on Farm Near Lomax.**  
La Porte, Tex.—Frank Burnett has erected a cannery factory on his farm in the Lomax neighborhood.

**Laredo, Tex.—**The onion shipment rush out of Laredo is on in earnest, sixty-nine carloads of Bermudas left Wednesday on five special trains.

President Wilson Saturday accepted the resignation of George M. Bowers, United States fish commissioner, to take effect immediately.

**Street Ethics in Chicago.**

Such a law would not be amiss in Chicago. Not only ethics, but ordinary decency and manliness are too frequently forgotten here. Let a thug assault a person in the street and the majority of men who happen along, instead of going to the assistance of the person assaulted, will scurry away so as not to be dragged into the affair. Let a person be injured by a street car and the people who witnessed the accident will refuse to give their names to be called upon as witnesses by the victim.

Whether all the ethics of citizenship can be enforced effectively through laws and ordinances may be doubted, yet the legal declaration of some primary duties would help to develop a conscience in such matters now apparently sadly lacking.—Chicago Tribune.


