Special Meeting of City Council

Ordinance Passed Relative to Borrowing Money--Street Crossing Plans and Specifications Are Adopted.

Abbeville, La., May 28, 1913. The council of the town of Abbeville met in special called session with Mayor Brasseur presiding, and all members answering to roll call. The mayor requested the reading of his call, as follows:

Abbeville, La., May 28, 1913. To the Hon. F. L. Melebeck, R. P. Nelson, J. C. Broussard and W. S. Hayes, councilmen, corporation of Abbeville, La.

Gentlemen: By virtue of the law, in me vested, as mayor of the town of Abbeville, La., I hereby call you to meet in special session at my office this day and date at 7:30 p. m., for the following purposes, namely:

First: To enact an ordinance authorizing the mayor to negotiate a loan of \$3,500.00 and to repeal an ordinance enacted on the 20th day of May, 1913, on the same subject matter.

Second: To adopt specifications entering into the construction of street crossings and plans therefor.

Witness my hand and seal of office this 28th day of May, 1913.

(Signed) ADOLPH BRASSEUX, Mayor, Town of Abbeville.

Service of the foregoing call is hereby accepted and citation waived at 3 o'clock p. m. this 28th day of May, 1913.

(Signed) W. S. HAYES, R. P. NELSON, J. C. BROUSSARD, F. L. MELEBECK.

On motion of R. P. Nelson, seconded by W. S. Hayes, that the ordinance adopted by this council at its session as of May 20, 1913 referring to and authorizing the negotiation of a loan of \$3,500, and duly of record in the minutes of the proceedings of this body on the aforesaid date, be and it is hereby repealed.

All voted yeo, and the mayor declared the ordinance above mentioned repealed.

AN ORDINANCE.

On motion of W. S. Hayes, seconded by J. C. Broussard, the following ordinance was read and after being duly put was unanimously adopted, the vote being registered as follows:

Dr. R. P. Nelson, yeo; F. L. Melebeck, yeo; W. S. Hayes, yeo; and J. C. Broussard, yeo.

The mayor declared the following adopted:

An ordinance authorizing the mayor of the town of Abbeville to negotiate a loan in an amount not exceeding \$3,500 on such terms as may be agreed upon between him and the lender, to meet past due bills and defray current expenses, payable not later than Feb. 10, 1914, and to sign for in the name of the Town of Abbeville, a note or notes in aggregate amount not exceeding \$3,500, maturing not later than Feb. 10, 1914, and conditioned to bear five per cent interest per annum after maturity, and to place the proceeds to the credit of the general fund.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the mayor and the board of aldermen of the town of Abbeville, La., that the mayor of the town of Abbeville is hereby authorized and instructed to borrow for the town of Abbeville, an amount not exceeding \$3,500, and to execute a note or notes for the sum borrowed, maturing not later than Feb. 10, 1914, and conditioned to bear five per cent per annum interest from maturity until paid, and additional ten per cent on the aggregate amount thereof, as attorney's fees.

Sec. 2. Be it ordained by the mayor and board of aldermen that the treasurer of the town is hereby instructed and directed to place the proceeds of the loan effected by the mayor, to the credit of the general fund.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that in addition to the amount that will be collected and credited to the general fund from the 1913 tax levy, the, 1914 licenses or as much thereof as may be

necessary are hereby pledged for the payment of the amount so borrowed.

Sec. 4. Be it further ordained, etc., that the secretary is hereby instructed and directed to draw from the general fund the amount necessary to retire the note or notes executed by the mayor at maturity.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., that this ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

On motion of Dr. R. P. Nelson, seconded by J. C. Broussard, the plan submitted as well the specifications herein after set out, are adopted as the plans and specifications to govern in the construction of concrete street crossing as per ordinance adopted as of May 20th, 1913, vote being registered thus:

R. P. Nelson, yeo; W. S. Hayes, yeo; J. C. Broussard, yeo; F. L. Melebeck, yeo, and declared duly adopted by the mayor.

Specifications for the construction of concrete crossings in the town of Abbeville, La., in strict accordance with the following specifications and plan on file with the secretary.

Excavations to be made exact width of crossings, to be of depth required, and to conform as much as possible to outline of bottom of crossings as shown in cross section.

Bottom of all excavations to be tamped to a hard and solid bearing and weal spots to be filled with concrete and rammed.

Materials--Cement throughout to be either Atlas Vulcanite, Lone Star, Universal or any other brand of Portland Cement that will meet with the approval of the mayor and council.

Sand to be clean, sharp, and free from any foreign matter.

Gravel--all gravel or crushed stone used to be clean and if the latter is used it must be of no greater dimensions than will pass through a 1 1/2" sieve.

Concrete--All concrete to be mixed in proportions of one part of cement to three parts of sand to five parts of gravel or crushed rock, all to be thoroughly mixed dry and watered sufficiently to bring it to proper consistency.

Cement Topping of approaches to be mixed in proportions of one part of cement to one and one-half parts of sand, or rock dust.

Approaches to be solid concrete, with firm bearing on ground and sloped at top from levels of sidewalks and crossings.

Approaches to be topped with 3-4 inch of cement as previously specified and troweled to a smooth and hard surface.

Crossings to be tamped till cement floats to surface and troweled to an even but rough surface.

Wherever necessary for draining 10" vitrified drain tile are to be inserted in concrete under approaches.

All work to be subject to approval of Council Committee and their Inspector.

On motion duly put and carried the council then adjourned.

Stop Eating Veal.

Town Talk's attention was called to the following facts by one who is familiar with the business. It is this: That is housewives, hotels, restaurants and cafes, and all those who cater to the appetites of the people would simply stop using "veal" for the period of two years, the amount of three and four-year-old choice beef that would accumulate would be sufficient to put the meat trust, and high price of beef out of commission.

Three million calves slaughtered in 1912 that weighed an average of sixty pounds, and was worth about six dollars per head on foot, at the end of the first year would have increased to four hundred pounds each, and be worth sixteen to twenty dollars. At the end of the second year they would weigh eight hundred pounds and be worth forty dollars each, and as graded cattle, many run as high as sixty to eighty dollars on foot.

So the fact remains that we are largely to blame for the high cost of beef, by using and continuing the use of meat at one age, when there is said to be absolutely no nutrition whatever in it. Many calves are slaughtered when the animal is so young that the meat is simply unfit for the use of men. --Alexandria Town-Talk.

Keep The Town Clean

The State Sanitary Code provides for the cleaning and disinfecting of open privies under the direction of the local board of health.

In keeping with the above, all parties are hereby notified, and each person having and using an open privy is hereby warned to at once clean same, and bury all excreta or thoroughly disinfect same with crude carbolic acid, or some other disinfectant, approved by the president of the board of health.

If you are within 150 feet of the town sewerage, you must connect with same without further delay.

You are also notified to keep all weeds and grass cut on lots occupied or owned by you.

You are also asked to observe the law relative to spitting on the sidewalks and in public buildings.
