And if the ten customers realize that they have saved money on the purchases the 'good will' profit to the store is very far-reaching.

So that, even in the case of a conservative merchant, 'selling stunts,' in which the self-interest of the customer is irresistible, constitute real store service. There is no sacrifice of 'dignity,' no pulling down of store creeds--but a showing of that progressive spirit of which makes a store really worth while. Thus the highest class stores and shops may put into their advertising that appeal to the self-interest of the reader which is always heeded--and which will always make advertising 'pay.'
