Development of Southwest La.

Southwest Louisiana has an area of 10,711 square miles which, leaving out of consideration the parish of Orleans, is 24,100 of the land area of the state. Leaving out the population of the city of New Orleans our estimated population of 340,000 is somewhat over 1-4 the population of the state. Still leaving out the parish of Orleans, the assessed valuation of which is \$245,000,000 and there is left for the balance of the state a total of \$333,455,000 of which this district carries approximately \$92,000,000 or 1-3, this despite the fact that such cities as Shreveport, Baton Rouge, Monroe and Alexandria are; included in the other districts.

But, if we may well be proud of our standing from this viewpoint, these figures serve but to accentuate more clearly some of our needs. Thus, in the matter of railroad transportation facilities there are in this district only 977 miles of single track for each 11 square miles of our area. In the state as a whole there are reported, aside from private lumber roads, sugar roads, etc., 5,257 miles of main track or one mile to each eight and three-fifths square miles of area. Thus, though we have 1-3 of Louisiana's valuation on 1-4 her area we have only four fifths the trackage per mile of area enjoyed by the state as a whole is far behind in mileage as compared with those of the Middle West.

Our need of capital for development purposes is shown too by the bank statistics. The total banking capital of the district is \$5,797,000 or approximately \$17. per inhabitant, about 85 cents per acre. For any development proposed it is easy to see that we must go outside the district for money. Under present conditions we are compelled to pay too high a price of the money we are compelled to borrow, and one of the markets this bureau must try to improve in the money market for farms loans and crop carrying.

Shipping Club is Organized Here

Tuesday evening a shipping club was organized here with seventeen members. The meeting was held at the Victor theater. Mr. J. H. Cockram, representing the Louisiana State University, and Mr. W. H. Stakelum, division freight and passenger agent of the Southern Pacific lines, with headquarters at Lake Charles, made talks regarding the possibilities and advantages of the organization of the club, which was listened to by an audience of about fifty people, mostly citizens of the city, and while many of them were not interested, there were enough who joined to form a strong organization.

The organization was formed with W. S. Durke, president; W. D. Gooch, vice president; F. W. Summers, secretary and treasurer and the following members: V. L. Caldwell, J. A. Schlessinger, J. H. Williams, Louis Vallee, J. Immergluck, O. A. Broussard, A. J. Godard, J. E. Nettles, A. O. Landry, J. W. O'Bryan, J. A. Wherland, J. H. Lutgring, Numa LeBlanc and Elias Broussard.

There is yet to be an official representative and two directors elected, which will probably take place at the next meeting of the club.

It was decided that the first Saturday of each month, in the afternoon at 3 o'clock would be the best time to hold the monthly meeting, which will be held at the court house. All farmers, whether they intend to become members or not, are cordially invited to attend the meetings.

Saturday was picked out as the best day to hold the meetings, as that day is one which the majority of the country people come to town, and the business men expressed their desire to have it most convenient for the farmers, as they will managed to get to the meetings, and the business men will make it their business to be there.

Since the organization there has been numerous framers who have expressed their desire to be members, and at the first meeting, it is likely that the organization will be more than doubled.

The object of the club is to have a ready market, and be prepared to ship on short notice, to the best and highest markets, where stock can be shipped to central markets where there is a demand. Each man's stock will sell on its merits. The expense is prorated on a basis of the number each member has in the shipment.



1,404 Registered Under Sec. 5

On Monday of this week Mr. A. O. Landry, appeared before Mr. F. J. Samson, notary public, and being duly sworn, according to law, deposes and says that he is a duly appointed and qualified deputy clerk of the district court and ex-officio registrar of voters, in and for the parish of Vermilion; that the number of persons who have registered under Sec. 5, of Article 197, of the constitution of the state of Louisiana, as amended by Act 24 of 1912, is 1,404, of which number there are 1,404 white and no colored, and that the name of all appar on the permanent register provided for by the said act, and now on file in his office.
